

## Class of '46

We are the Seniors. To the Eighth-graders we are "gods" set on high pedestals. To the Freshmen we are big brothers and sisters. To the Sophomores we are merely Seniors, for they have reached that in-between stage when they awaken to the potentialities within their own class. To the Juniors we are friends and co-workers. To ourselves we are an active group with many responsibilities, as well as numerous pleasures. We feel proud and superior, for we have reached the last lap of a long, difficult journey.

Our high school career began in September, 1941, when 208 students entered the eighth grade at William Byrd. We were placed under the guidance of Miss Harriet Zimmerman. We elected as officers Freeman Jenrette, Sherrill Dudley, Jacqueline Iddings and Jean Smith. We presented several assembly programs during the year. But the event that stands out most in our memory was Japan's treacherous attack on Pearl Harbor which led our nation into war against Japan, and later against Germany and Italy.

In 1942, we entered our Freshman year with Mrs. Manie L. Sifford as our sponsor and Freeman Jenrette, Sherrill Dudley, Joe Jeter and Jean Smith as officers. Many of us became active in athletics and in other school activities, and though these were somewhat curtailed by the war, it was in

general, a successful year.

Our Sophomore year began in 1943. We elected Perry Anderson, Bette Carter and Louise Lewis as officers, and Miss Sylvia Nelms was assigned as sponsor. One of the best assembly programs which we presented that year was a modernized version of "Gone with the Wind." An outstanding achievement for the class was the producing of two state literary champions—Dorothy Wood, for prose reading, and Iona Green, for poetry reading.

In 1944, we returned to Byrd as Juniors. Miss Sylvia Nelms and Mrs. Mary C. Goble were our sponsors and Freeman Jenrette, Joe Francis, Jacqueline Iddings and Lenore Seibel were our officers. We selected our class colors, flower and motto. Our motto, "Laugh and the World Laughs with You," was a fitting choice, for it would be difficult to find a more cheerful class than ours.

As the annual Junior Class Play, we presented Katherine Kavanaugh's "Girl Shy." The cast included Billy Crafton, Jean Smith, Freeman Jenrette, Bette Carter, Joe Jeter, Mary Lyne Kucera, Sherrill Dudley, Bessie Patsel, Joe Francis, Ruby Webber, Don Gross and Virginia Forbes.

In the spring we entertained the Seniors with a reception. The gymnasium was beautifully decorated and tables for four were arranged around the dance floor. A program was presented by members of our class, and music for dancing was furnished by the newly formed school orchestra, the "Thirteen Off-Beats."

We assisted the Seniors in their commencement exercises and bade them farewell.

In 1945, the beginning of this school year, we returned to William Byrd as Seniors; 54 in number.

Our sponsors are Miss Geraldine Montgomery and Mrs. Manie L. Sifford, and our class officers are Freeman Jenrette, Betty Patteson, Virginia Comer, and Mary Lyne Kucera.

This is the first of our high school years in which the world has known peace, and because of this we are able to resume many of the pre-war Senior activities and to initiate new ones.

We are once again planning the Senior class trip. To raise money for this we have sponsored projects such as sales of caps and badges made in school colors, sales of flavoring, and a magazine sales contest.



# Senior Class History

Senior Day was a new activity. The main events of the day were a senior assembly, athletic contests between the Seniors and the Juniors, and a weiner roast. During the school day the under-

classmen were asked to show certain courtesies to us.

In December we held the Senior Ring Dance. The ring motif was carried out in decorating the gymnasium. In the ring ceremony the couples walked through a large replica of the class ring. While passing through the "Big Ring," each received his ring from his date. After this our class president and his date led the grand march and the figure. During the rest of the evening we enjoyed dancing to our favorite music.

Each year the faculty of our school chooses a Senior girl as "good citizen," to be sponsored by the Colonel William Preston Chapter of the D. A. R. This year Louise Lewis was given this

honor.

As the Black Swan goes to press, our class history is still incomplete. The Senior girls plan to challenge the faculty to a basketball game at the end of the basketball season. In the spring there is to be a Senior talent assembly. The next event will be the annual Senior Class Play, and later we will receive small, humorous gifts in the Giftorian Assembly. The Juniors will entertain us at the Junior-Senior Reception, and they will cap us in the Cap and Gown Ceremony. Following the Baccalaureate Sermon, the Commencement exercises, and the Final Award Assembly, we will say good-bye to William Byrd.

Five years we've spent within these halls, Engaged in work and play; Now we must say good-bye to all And go our separate ways.

On you, classmates and teachers—Byrd, Our memories are fixed; We hope you will not soon forget The Class of '46.

## Junior Class History

In September of 1942, William Byrd High School opened its doors to admit one hundred and eighty-one new students as eighth-graders.

With natural pride in being a part of William Byrd at last, we, set about electing our class officers.

Entering school in the fall of '42 gave us the opportunity to take part in the War Bond sales held at the school.

The following year, our second, found us feeling a little superior over the fact that we were now "old-timers." Although we now numbered only eighty-seven we went ahead planning our activities and electing officers.

Upon entering the tenth grade we felt we had reached the half-way mark. Gradually we were beginning to take our place at Byrd.

# Gootball, 1945

On September 1st, Coach William (Bill) Judy issued a call for candidates for the 1945 football squad. The nucleus of the '45 team was built around ten returning letter men from the '44 outfit.

The "Terriers," somewhat stronger than in recent years, opened their season by trouncing the Christiansburg Demons, 20—6. The "Terriers" fast-moving "T" formation put them in the lead early in the game and kept them there in spite of the muddy condition of the Christiansburg field.

On September 21st, Byrd again traveled, this time to Bedford. Here Byrd chalked up her second win of the season, which proved to be a field day for the "Terriers" as they walloped a scrappy Bedford team, 40—0. Lantz led the scoring with three tallies, while Griffith, Patsel and Adkins followed with one each.

On the defense, Co-Captains Comer and Jenrette were outstanding along with C. Ryan, Hendricks and Patsel.

Jefferson, next to face the "Terriers," proved to be too strong for the comparatively "green" Byrd outfit. The game was all Jefferson in the first, second and fourth quarters with Byrd having a slight edge in the third quarter. But Jefferson's power easily brought them through to a 41—6 victory.

Byrd's fourth game was played at Salem in a drizzling rain. Fumbles in this game were numerous and passes were few. It was on an intercepted pass that

Salem scored the winning touchdown about two minutes before the half. The game was hard fought and well played and could not be termed a defeat despite the score of 12—7 in Salem's favor.

Before the largest Homecoming crowd in the school's history, the "Terriers" again upheld a school tradition by whipping the Radford "Bobcats" 14—6. The game was a hard-pitched battle for both sides and at times it looked as if it might be a "Bobcat" victory. Jenrette, Wirt, Bishop and Comer played good ball in the line, while Butterworth, Patsel, Martin and Lantz showed up well in the backfield.

The "Terriers" topped Dublin, 18—6, for their fourth win of the season. The "Terrier" line proved too heavy for the Dublin eleven and after the first five minutes there was hardly any doubt of the outcome.

On October 24th, Byrd traveled to Martinsville. Here they lost their first Class B game to a hard-fighting and heavier Martinsville team. Comer, Byrd co-captain, had to leave the game on the third play because of a fractured arm. When the whistle ended the game, it found Martinsville ahead, 12—0.

The next game was one of the most successful of the season for Byrd. The game was played in a drizzle on a rain-soaked field, but the "Terriers" easily trounced Schoolfield 31—0.

On November 10th, Fleming came to Byrd with an unbeaten record and expecting an easy win. The game was Fleming's for the first three quarters, then Byrd put on the steam and scored 12 points in less than six minutes. The game was hard fought all the way, but Fleming came through with a 23—12 victory. The last quarter proved exciting to the Byrd fans as Byrd's passing attack easily clicked and had Fleming on the fence for a time.

On November 17th, Byrd played its last game of the season against Blacksburg. This game was the toughest of the season for the team and ended in a 13—13 tie. The Blacksburg boys played "heads-up" football and the "Terriers" had a hard game of it. Blacksburg was threatening in the last two minutes of the game when Goggin, Byrd halfback, intercepted a pass and ran it back 75 yards as the whistle ended the game.

As a result of cooperation among the players and coaches, Bishop, as guard, and Jenrette, as end, received a well-earned position on the All City-County Team.


