





Certainly, weather does play a major role in our filming "North by Southview", as it effects the minds and mannerisms of the colossal Northsiders.



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




s we scurry from classroom to classroom in our daily routine here at Northside, seldom do we realize that we are participating in what is the main purpose of our filmed production.


SENIOR CLASS HISTORY

We also participated and assisted with the Northside and Roanoke County Science fairs.



This portion of our filming was full of fond memories and laughter, color, and excitement, which we will always hold dear; which we now proudly spotlight as SPECIAL REVUES.


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






