

All Seniors Keep Sea Chest Of Memories


One day, long after that memorable first day, the dawn came brighter than it usually did. Crew members appeared on deck with bright, smiling faces.

Students Find New Courses At R.C.E.C.








Students Are Urged To Prevail In Math


Northside's Jeachers Care About Students

All teachers had work to take home. There were lesson plans to do, papers to grade, research to do. But students at NHS could successfully face later life because their high school teachers had cared.











Young Grew Members Feel Nostalgic Pangs

Membership Serves As Stepping Stone











The North Winds, Northside's greatly improved newspaper, put out nine issues this year. Articles and editorials were written by Editor Jim Clark and the staff and accepted from students.






Keyettes Sail High In Area of Service


The National Honor Society also came into view for sophomores, especially during the tension-filled tapping assembly in May. About thirteen lucky sophomores gained membership this year.








A Sophomore Crew Takes Responsibility



Only the echo of cheers remained after the Vikings finished their season with a 20-2 record.







With an abundance of player material, the "Baby Vikings" began practicing for the season of 1968-69 soon after the Varsity squad.








In overall points, in the tournament, the Vikings piled up 96, with the closest contenders, Garfield and Pulaski, having only 55 points.







Although Byrd's cheerleaders try to hustle their wrestler onward, Neil Obenshain ruins their efforts by putting his opponent flat on his back.

During the regular season, the Northside team virtually rolled over all of their opponents. The closest score, 31-8, came in a tough match against highly-rated V.S.D.B.



In the 1970 season, the Vikings will have a record high of three returning State Champions.




Heavy weight wrestler, Roger Bradley, observes his fellow teammates warm-up before a match.




9-2 Record Elates Viking Cindermen





Although only in their second season, the team played in the District tournament with a 5-9 record. Prospects for next year presented a cheerful outlook.








Seaworthy Juniors Put On Class Play







A Blend Of Moods Create Aura Daily














From the sound of the morning bell for homeroom on Friday, the whole atmosphere at NHS remains charged with an air of anticipation so intense it is almost electrically tangible.

But at the sound of the 3:50 bell, the story changes.



Much time went into getting plans "ship-shape" for a Christmas concert on December 12. The event sent the audience soaring with Yuletide enthusiasm.


As the year ended, swells of "Going Out of My Head" filled the spring air. The choir busily learned words and notes for a spring concert on May 7.










A Sun Settles Upon "A Summer Place"



Baccalaureate Sives Meaningful Thoughts


