


Hidden Valley never seemed to be quiet. Even at home, we thought of our school, and the tranquillity it offered as a part of our life.











School Day




#### Desert Moon


Have you ever thought about a game without cheerleaders?




#### Football Fever

During the season you saw the team practicing after school virtually every day, testing new plays, and reviewing old ones. When Thursday came around, those plays were put to the test.













Lisa Allison and Cindy Price were chosen for the All District team, representing the Lady Eagles.












#### "Lady Eagles:" Champions Once Again

#### Wrestling



In order to have such an excellent season, each wrestler endured strenuous practices and stayed at weight. This required hard work and dedication on the part of each team member.


With the expert guidance of the coach the wrestler was prepared for the match or, as Coach Spangler said, "The hardest five minutes of your life!"



# English







#### Mathematics

### Latin lives...



Students taking French got to do very exciting things this year, such as writing to French students taking English, getting French T-shirts, and seeing the play "The Three Musketeers."






Listening skills take effect when you talk about any language and the headphones are an important part of the Spanish classes. Listening through them helped the students interpret the many words and phrases that come with the class.







Our school is in excellent condition thanks to the men and women on our custodian staff. They have many jobs to do that keep them busy from early morning until after the end of our school day.












#### **ORGANIZATIONS**








# Drama Club
