


A fire drill interrupts classes frequently during the first month of school. However, the importance of the drill is reflected in the orderly and quiet manner in which students exit the building.



The new members of our student body, the sixth graders, took pride in their school and showed it with immense school spirit. They participated in all of the action during spirit



Lance Brewer says, "My freshman year was a time of enjoyment and hardship."




























We asked Coach Hicks about his first season.

"Before the first game I was as nervous as I ever was when I played. I pace back and forth in the locker room, my hands sweated, I had butterflies ... the whole bit.

"The feeling I had after our first victory, which was fortunately our first game, was great! I felt as though we had won a championship. It gave me confidence in my coaching ability.








