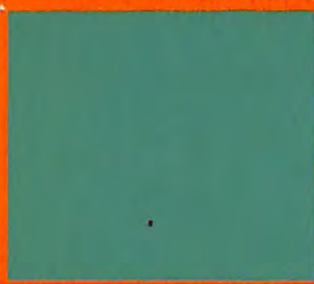

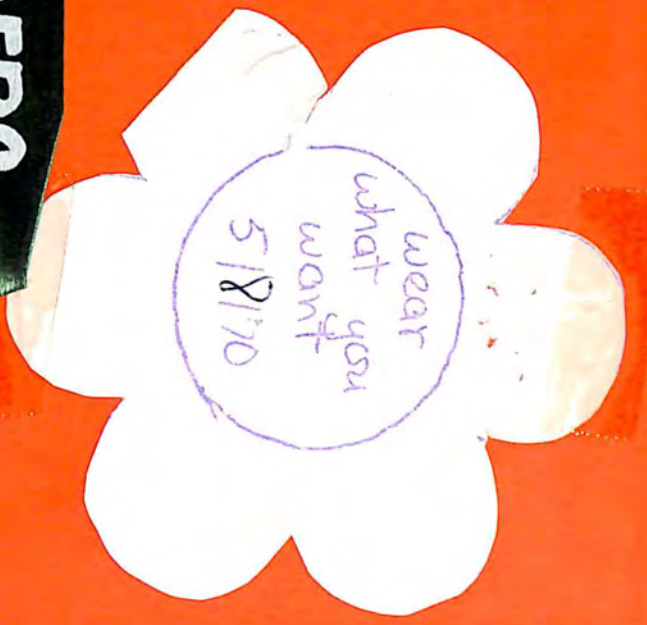

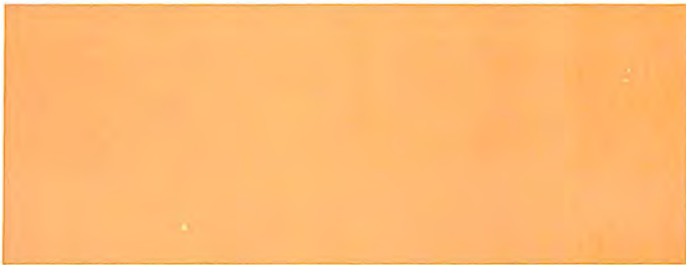






You were the first to tread these halls, the first to light the torch of learning here, the first to set traditions, and the first to be graduated from Glenvar High School.

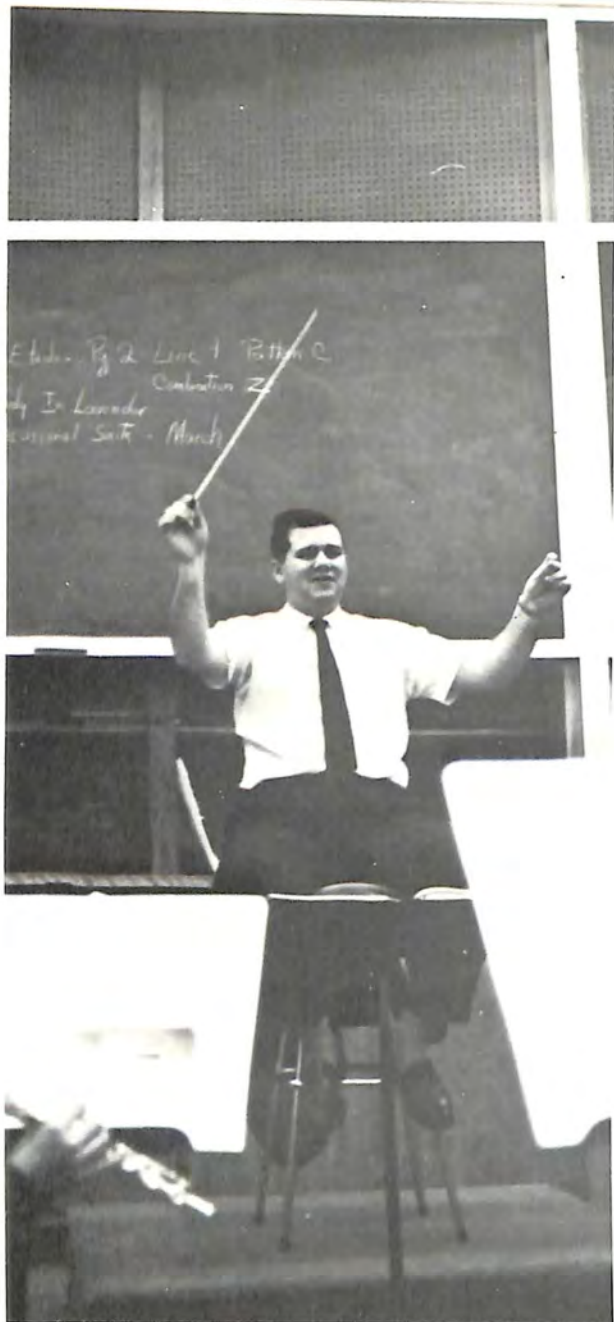

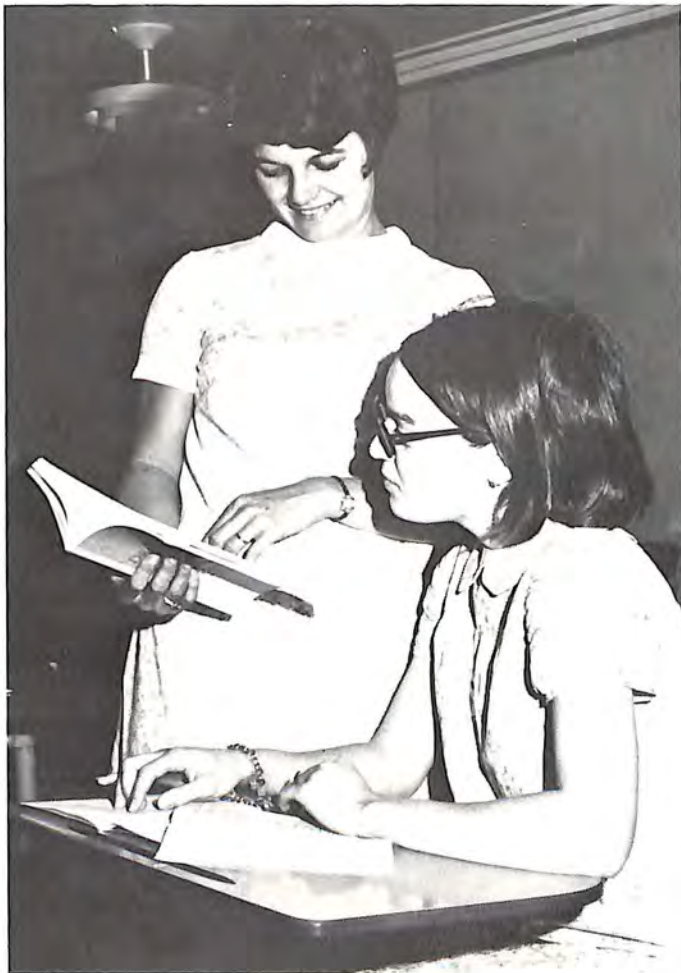

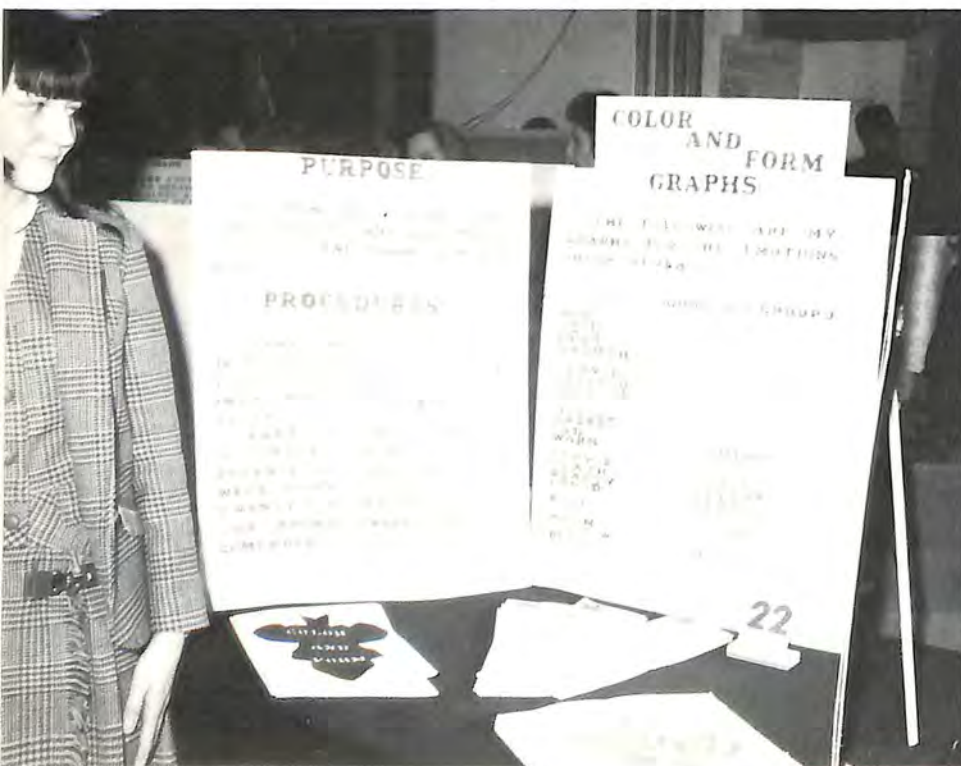

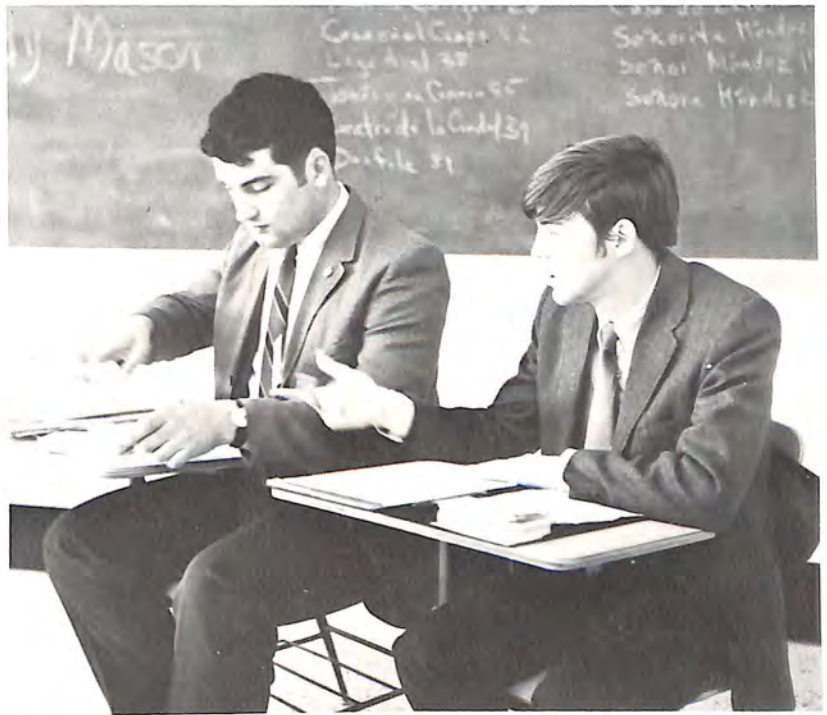

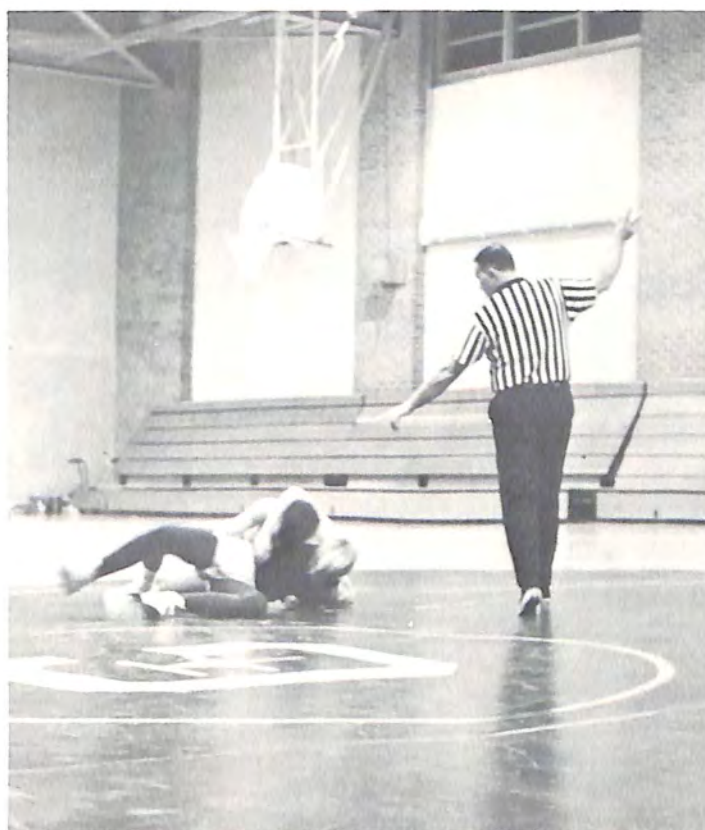
