## Guidance Offers Help

Guidance in planning high school curricula and education after high school was essential to most students. For every student, a schedule of studies was made up each year. This schedule took into account both the students' needs and abilities and his future plans. Such schedules were correlated to the three high school curricula offered; thus, each student was able to meet the requirements for a college preparatory, commercial, or general diploma.
Guidance counselors often recommended courses that pertained to a student's special interests. Taking such courses enabled one to formulate a picture of
his vocational possibilities. Specific courses might help an indecisive student to choose a career. In addition, free vocational aptitude tests were often made available to seniors.

There was further assistance available for collegebound students. Educational development and college board tests indicated one's general areas of weakness and ability. Counselors helped a student to select the college or colleges which fitted his needs and whose requirements he met, to apply for admission, and to seek the necessary grants, aids, or scholarships.
