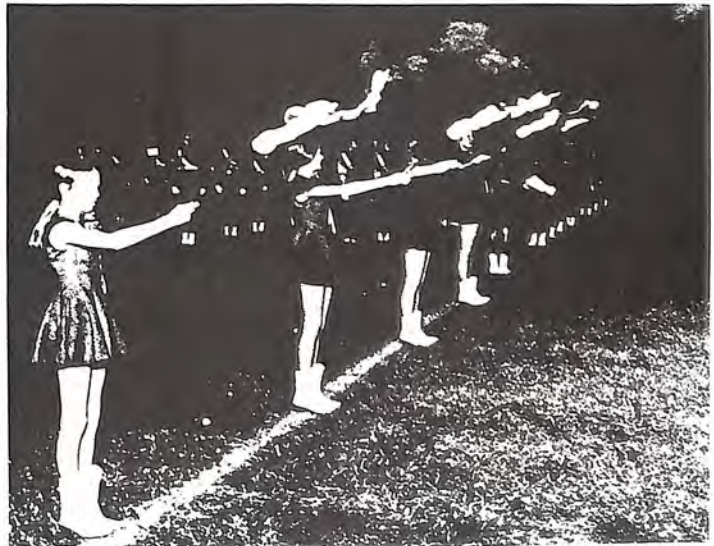

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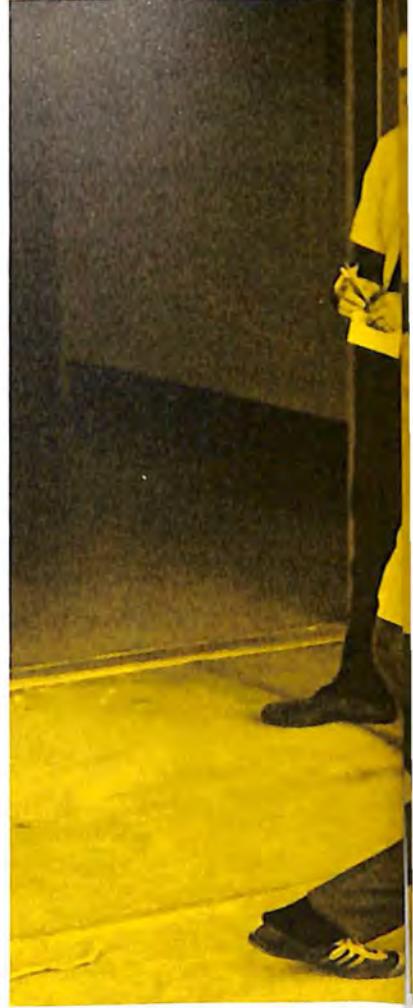
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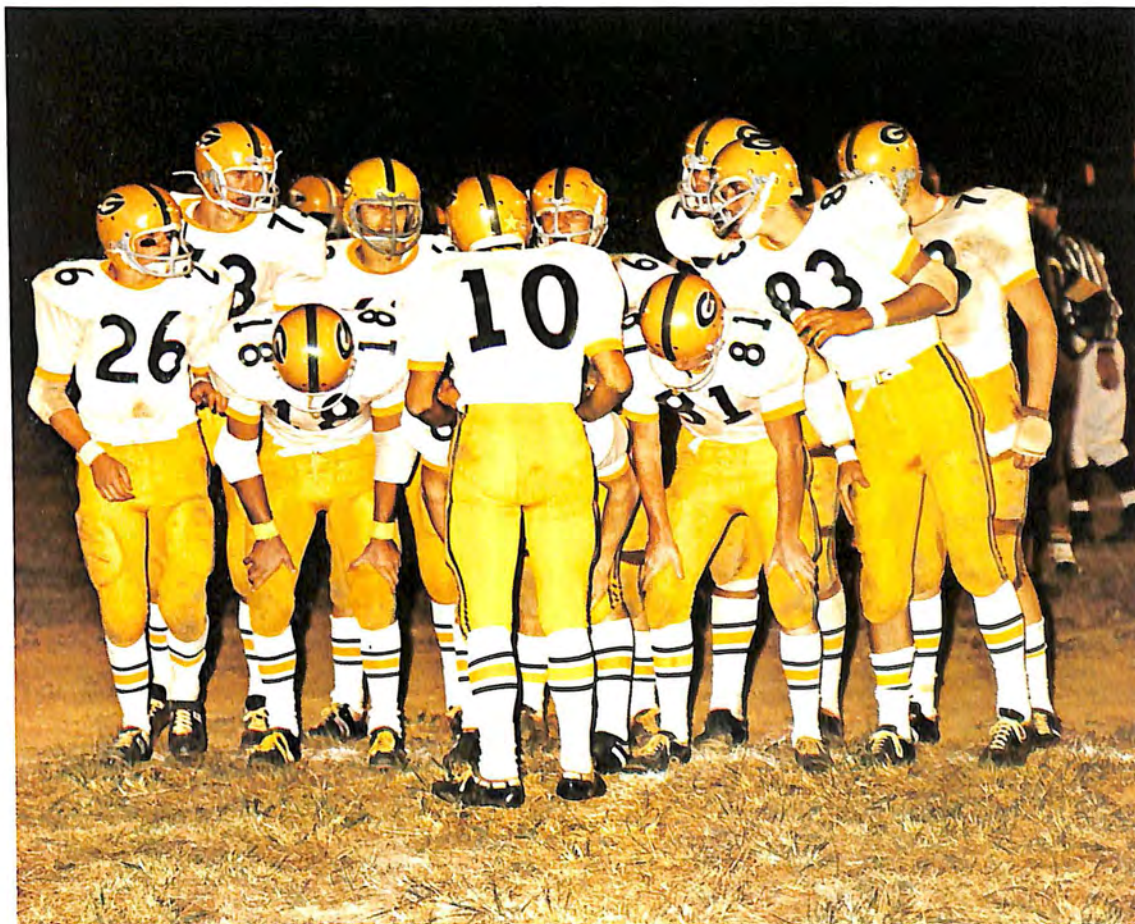
By Accepting One Another

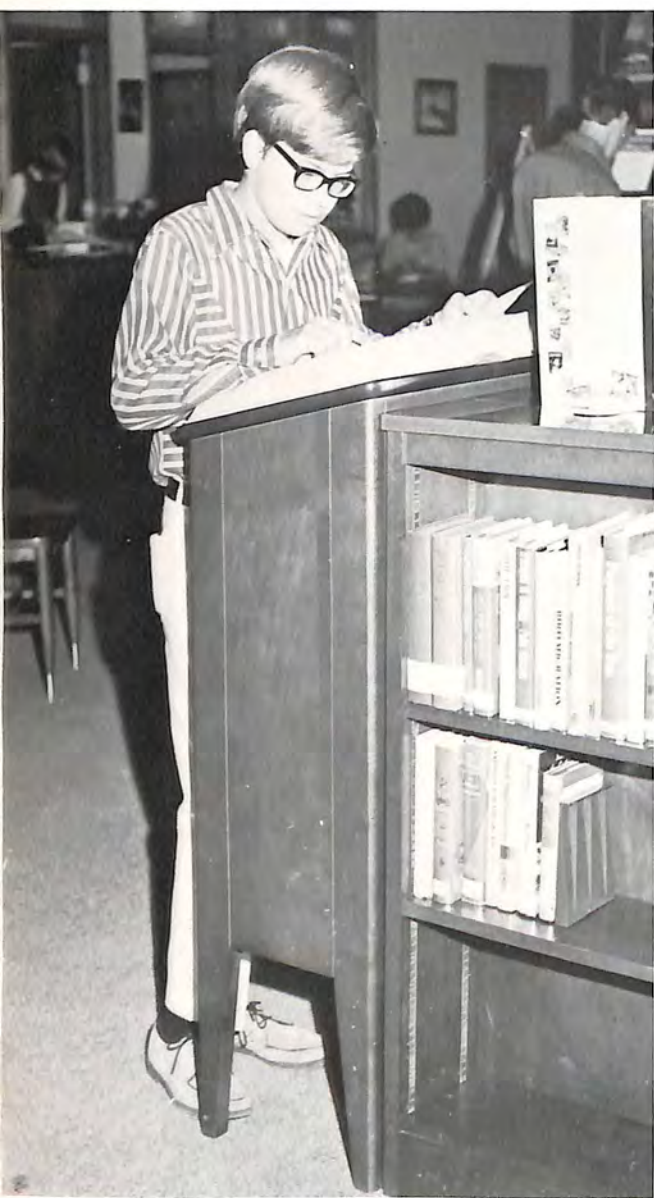

He has devoted a great part of his life in being concerned with others. Five years he has given to us, and so to him, Mr. Berkley Lucas, we give our dedication.

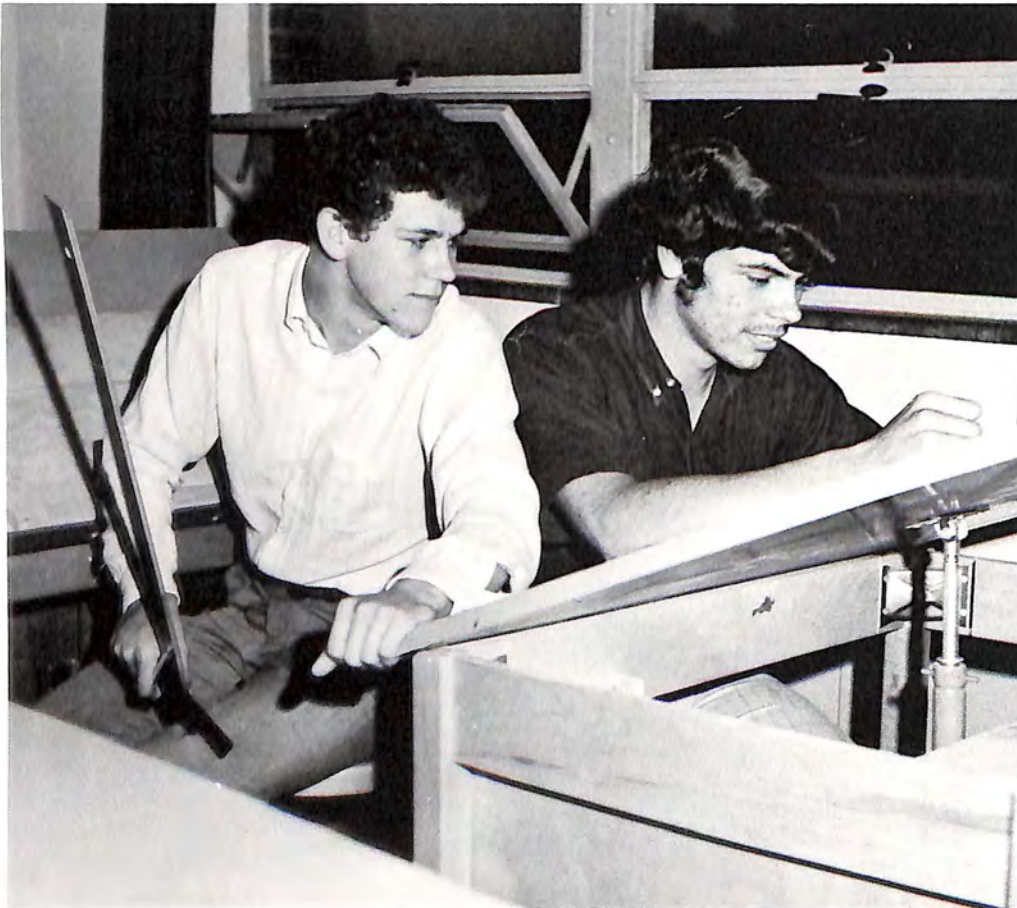
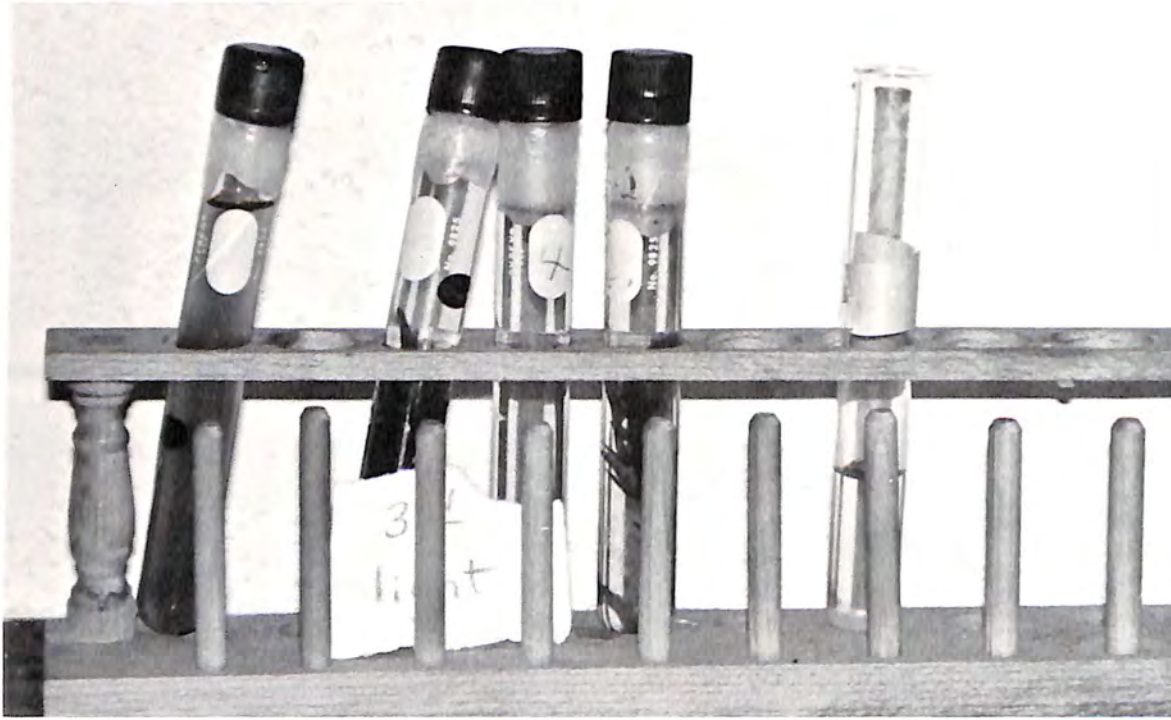

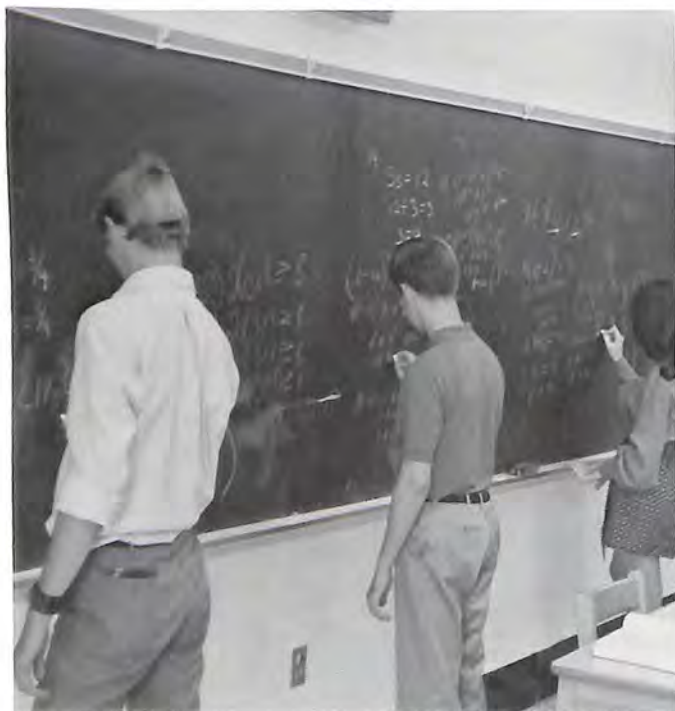
"Class, get out your rules, a piece of paper and a pencil." And so began another day of Math class for the students at G.H.S. Math was offered at every grade level, with a variety of skills being taught. Seventh and eighth grade students worked with the basic skills of Mathematics. College bound students were offered courses in Algebra I and II and Geometry. They struggled with word problems, equations, and inequalities. The students were introduced to theorems and found themselves tackling the problems of proofs for homework.

Advanced courses, such as Math Survey and Trig, were available to interested students. Trig students were confronted with Cartesian sets while Math Survey students worked with cosines and tangents.

The Math Department was successful in its goal of teaching students that logic and reason were more important than memorization.

This year at Glenvar, students faced the perils of English grammar and literature. In the lower grades, students were taught grammar skills. They always looked for dangling participles and misplaced modifiers. Students were encouraged to broaden their vocabularies. They were found sweating over a test of definitions that they just simply forgot to look up. In the upper grades, students were encouraged to put their skills to use. They wrote creative short stories, themes, poems, and term papers.

Students also tackled the problems of literature. When they weren't having trouble figuring out a modernist, they were attempting to understand the classics. The styles varied from "Romeo and Juliet" to "Our Town." As a result, Glenvar students entered the world prepared to communicate.

Dissecting earthworms, looking at chick embryos, counting fruit flies, or watching microscopic amebas—these were part of the biology labs '70-'71. Lectures on ecology and conservation, walks on the nature trail, and trying to understand why people litter our highways were another part of the year. Finally the students reached their goal of partially understanding how our world functions.

Learning the fundamentals of levers, the principles of centrifugal force, the basic ideas of electricity, and the workings of magnetisms were all learned in labs. These ideas and laws were things they could apply not only later in life but now when they needed it most.

Students taking Social Studies learned the history of yesterday and how it can affect tomorrow. In the classroom, teachers emphasized Negro history so that all students, black and white, would be able to understand the role of the Negro in world history. The government students learned how the founding fathers of the United States fought to establish a union, and became acquainted with the principles on which they based the government.

Guest speakers came to many classes and expressed their ideas. Newspapers and *Newsweek* magazines were used to enlighten the students in history as it was being made. Many new records and filmstrips were used to aid the students as they studied the past. The government classes took a trip to Richmond where they were able to study the state government first hand. Other history classes went to Old Salem, North Carolina where they were shown the living environment of our forefathers. As students finished their Social Studies courses they became more aware of the world around them.

In class they studied music and the history of the theatre, together with courses in acting, producing, directing, set building, writing, and make-up. The new concept of batik was introduced, and the students experimented by decorating scarves and blue jeans. They worked the majority of their time on individual projects. Both first and second year students were required to have one sketch a week to develop their shading.

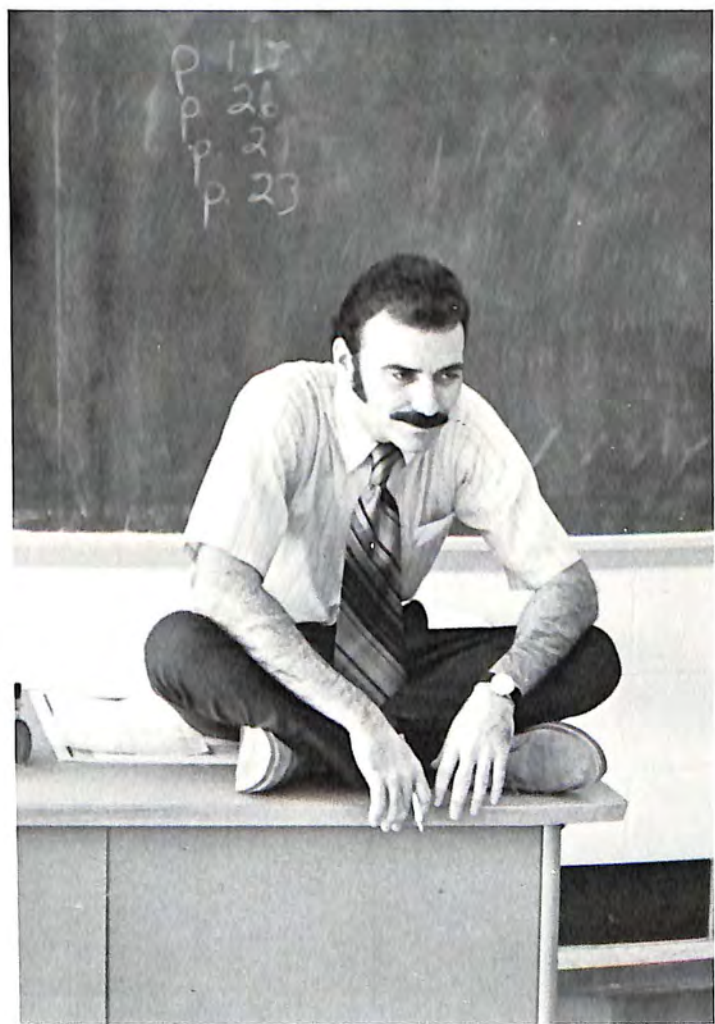

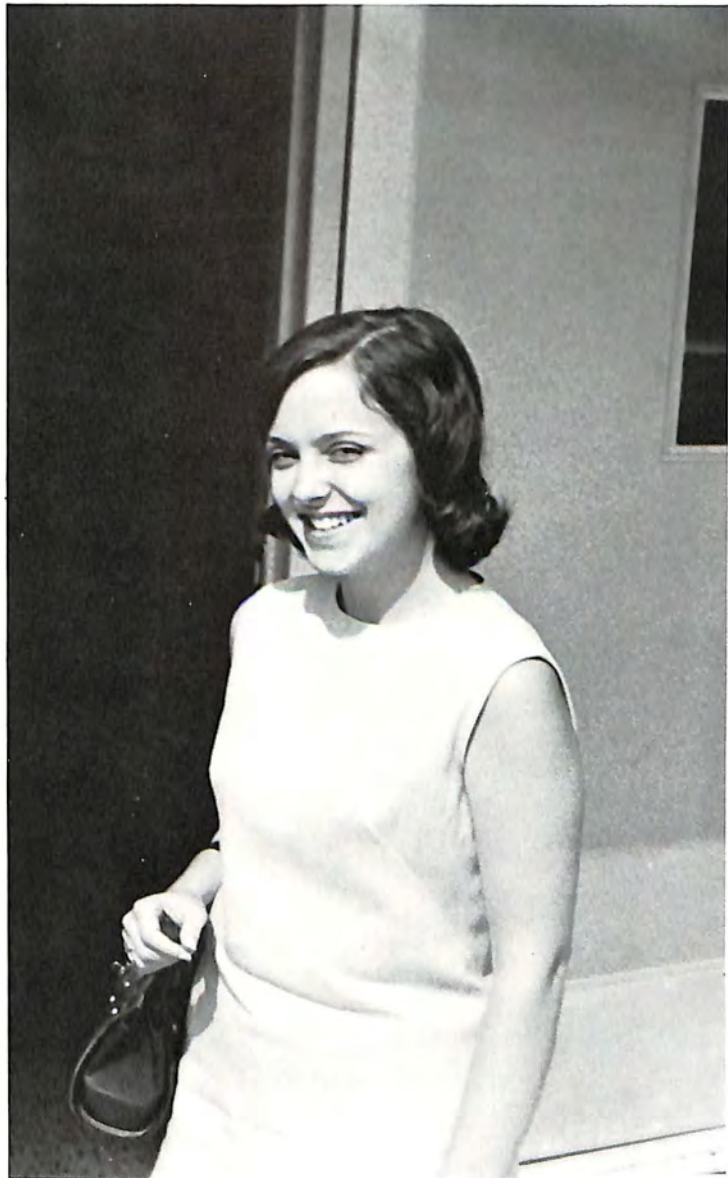

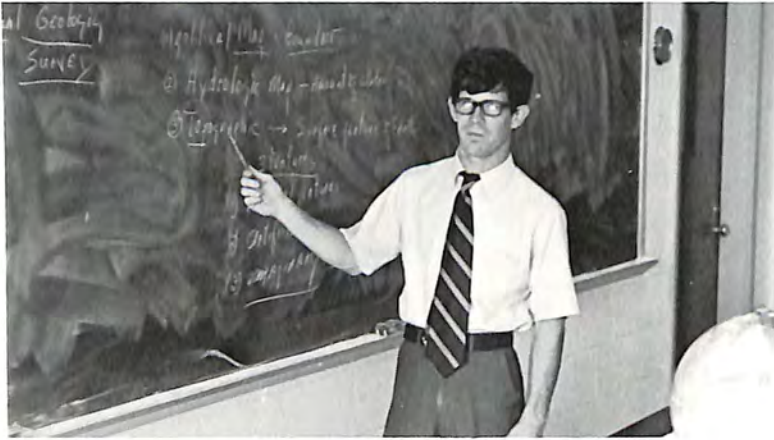

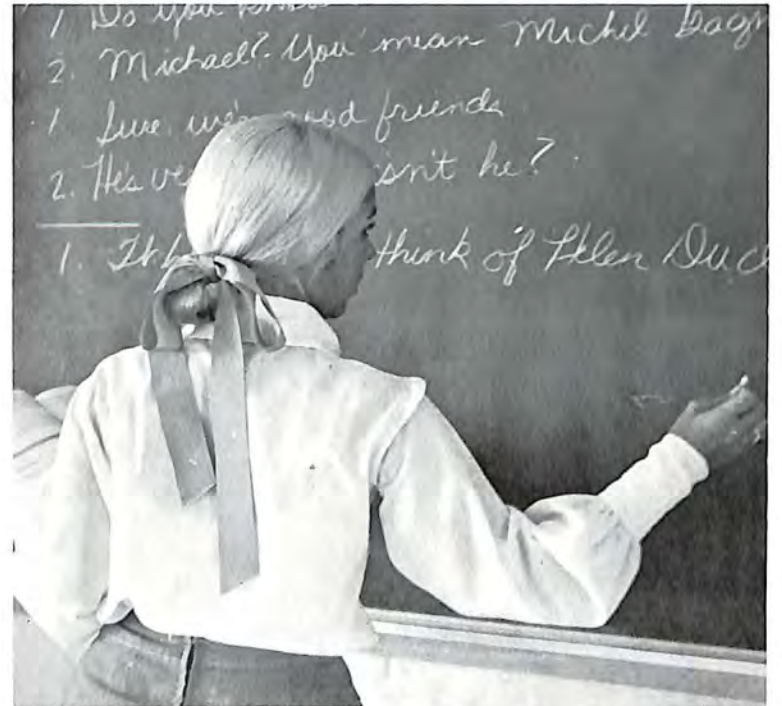


LANGUAGE DEPARTMENT

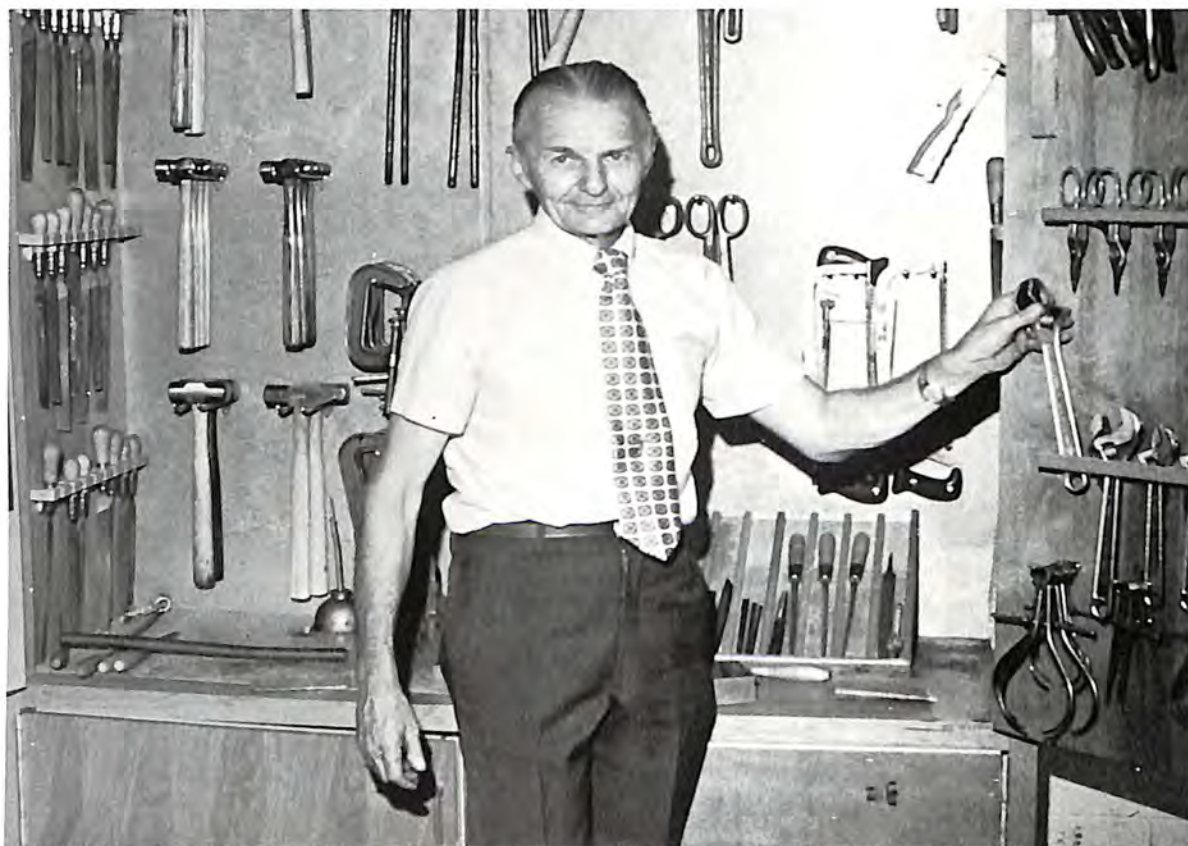
MUSIC DEPARTMENT

The first nine weeks dealt mainly on working with drawings, which is the basis for all shop activity. During the second nine weeks, the students were exposed to wood working tools. They built clip boards and other simple items to familiarize themselves with the art of woodworking. In the third nine weeks, each student built a simple electric motor and studied its function. The final nine weeks was spent using soft metal in making towel racks and plant holders.

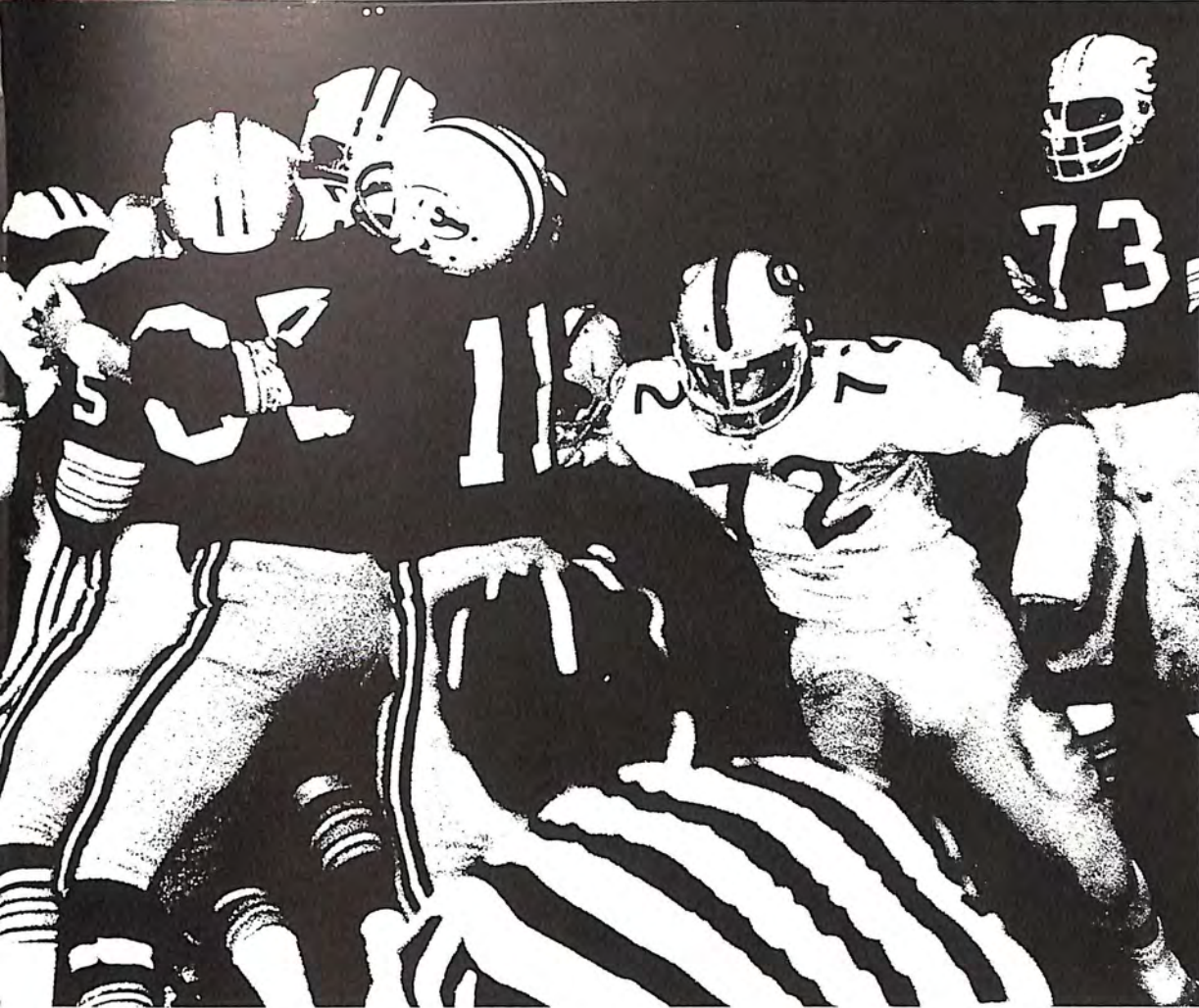

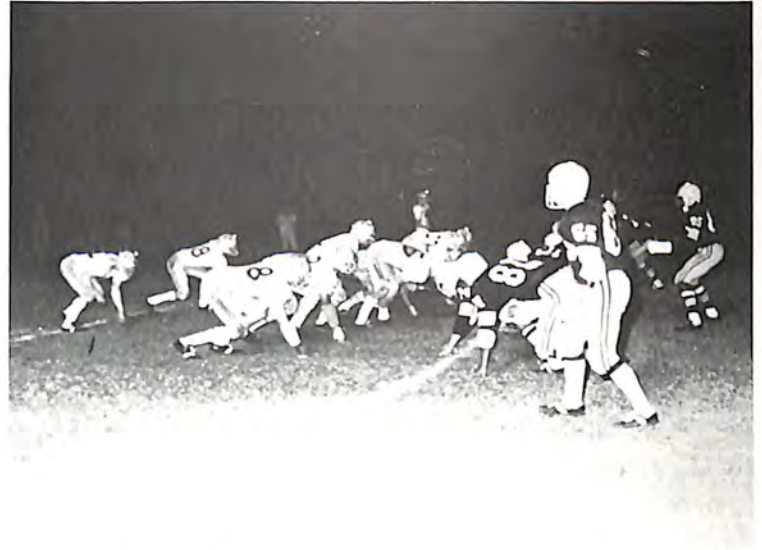

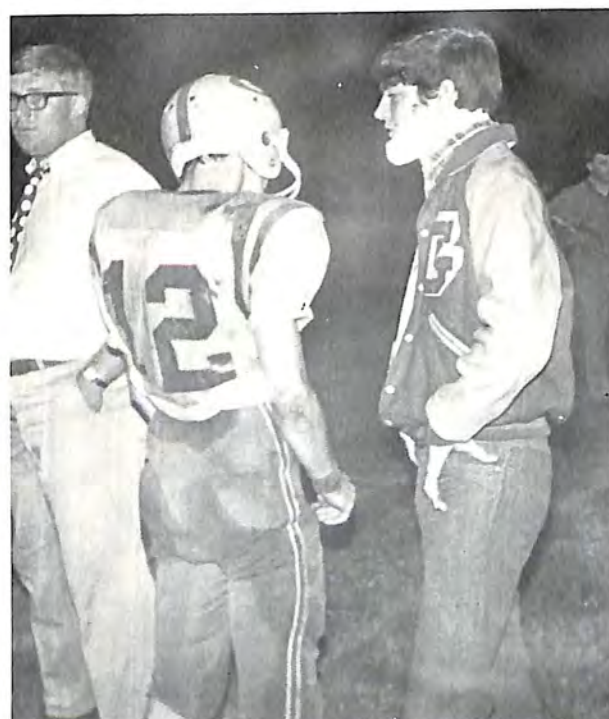

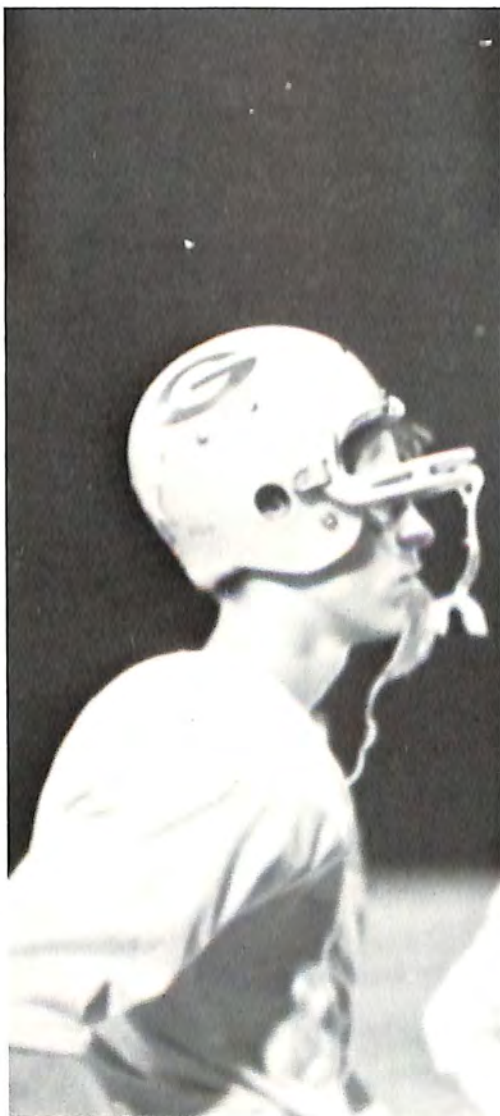

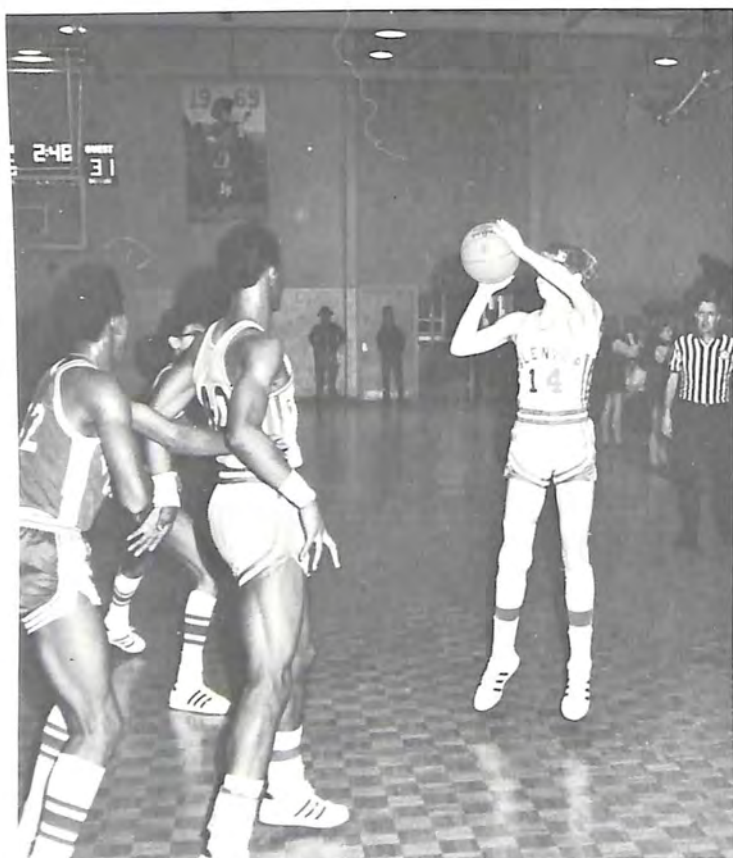

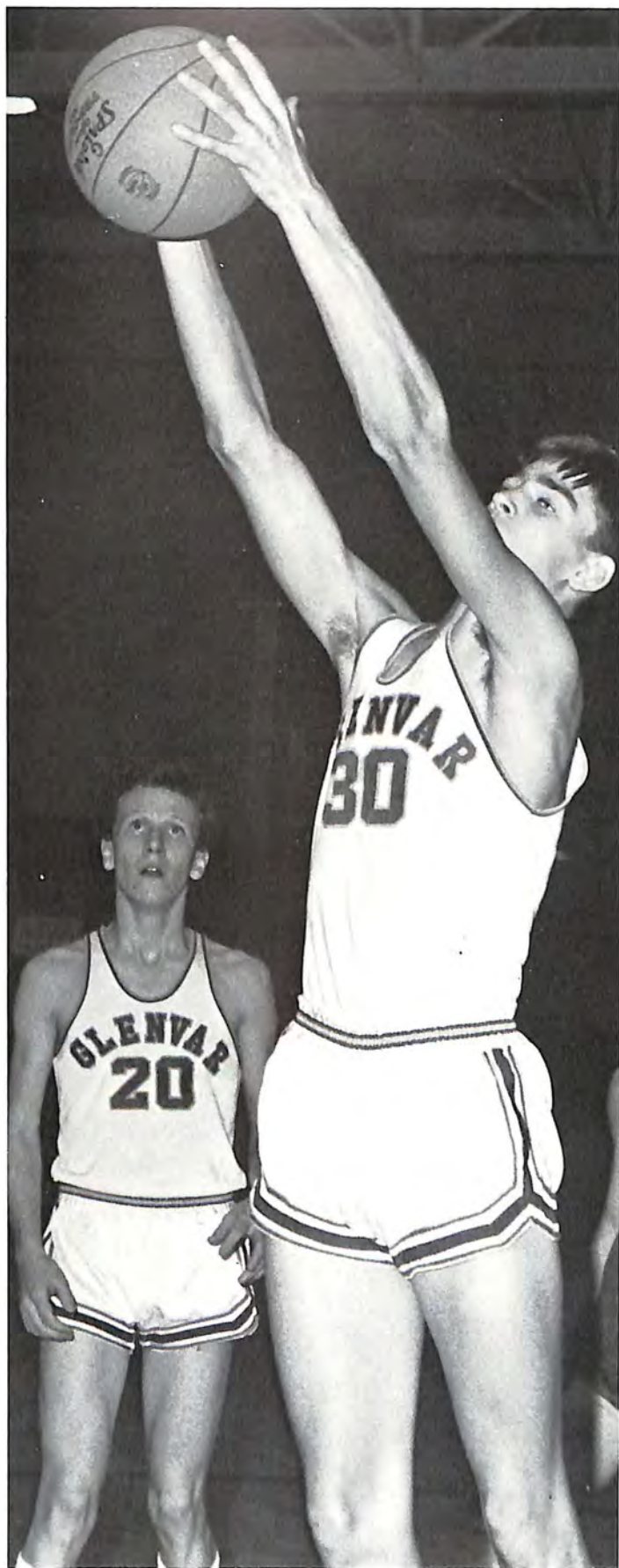

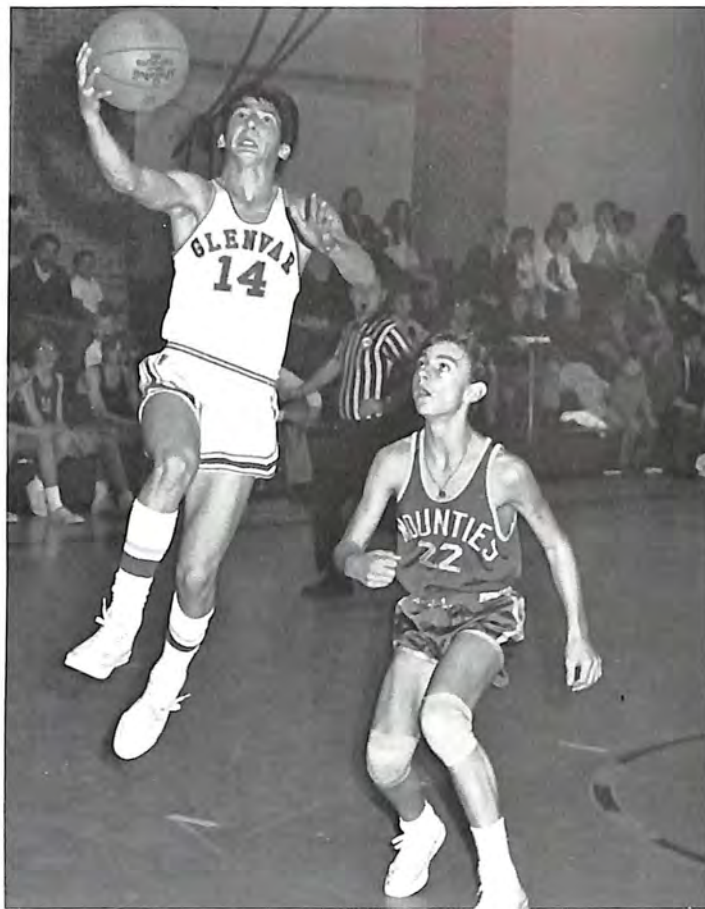

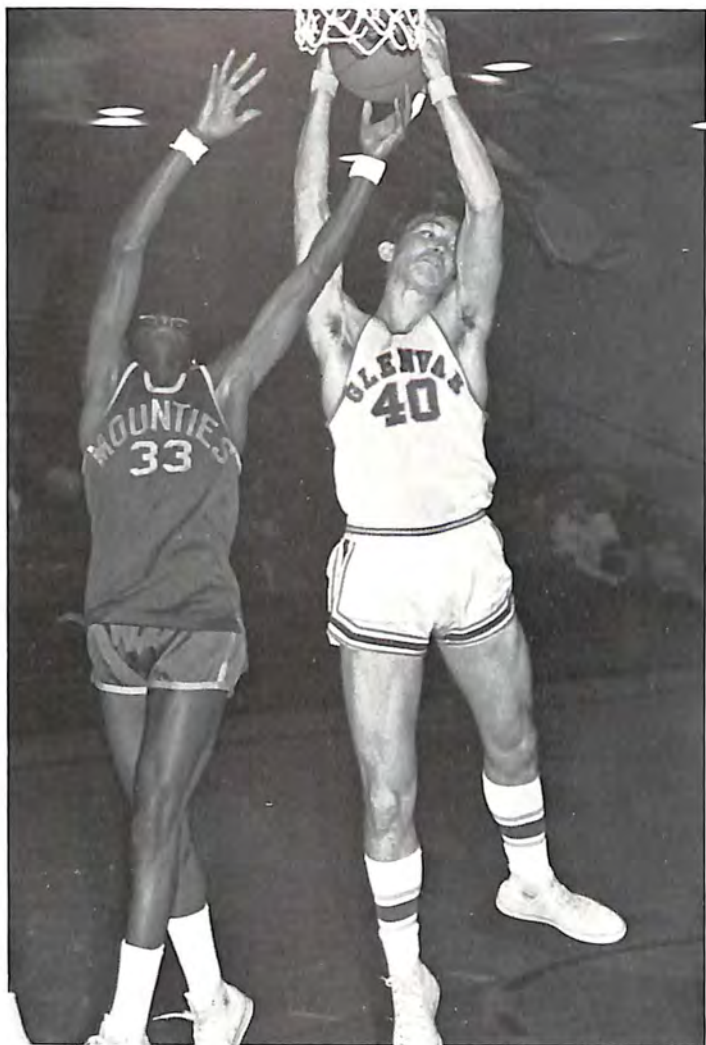

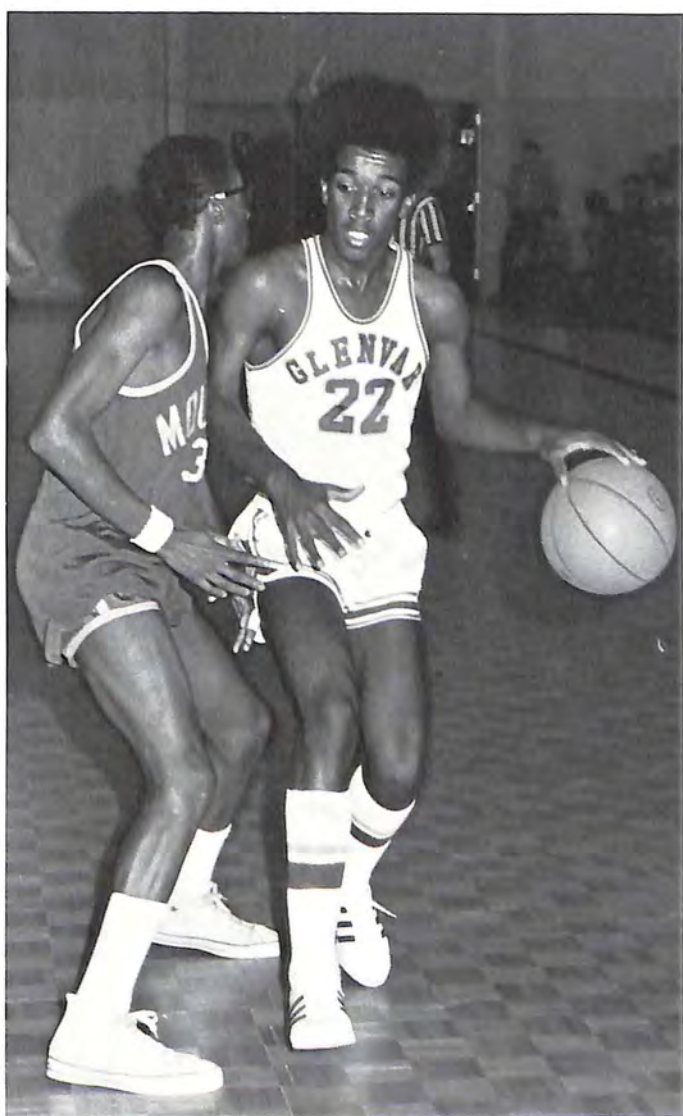

Glenvar was very successful with both its single and its united causes. The team was able to boast two undefeated matmen, one of whom was credited with 13 pins. The squad's success came in many ways. It was the Highlander middle and heavy-weight wrestlers who handed Northside its second loss in 67 matches. By that 22-20 thriller, GHS took from the Vikings a four year old crown, the city-county championship.

Glenvar hosted the Blue Ridge District Tour-

nament, and as expected came out the victor. This goal was met through seven first places, one second and two thirds. Regional competition proved to have the same overall results as district, as the Highlanders finished number one.

Fauquier High School was the setting of the final, and most successful point in the 70-71 effort. Eight Glenvar wrestlers made their way either to the finals, or to the consolation matches. At the conclusion of a great season, four of these eight became State champions. One placed third, and the other three boasted fourth place State finishes.

Through much toil and trouble, twenty-four men and a coach jelled themselves into a wrestling unit. The results were worth the effort; Glenvar became the State's Wrestling Champion.

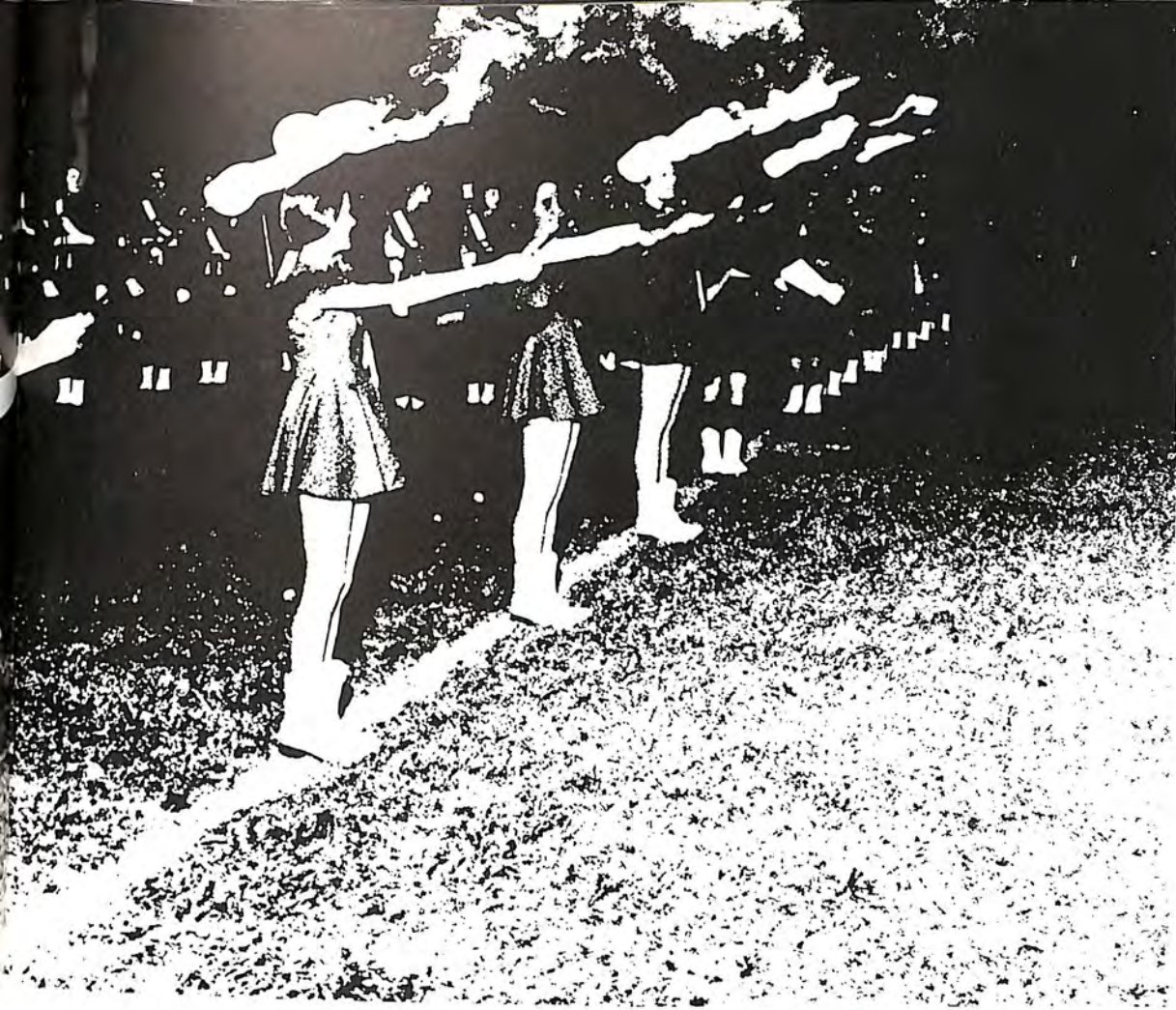

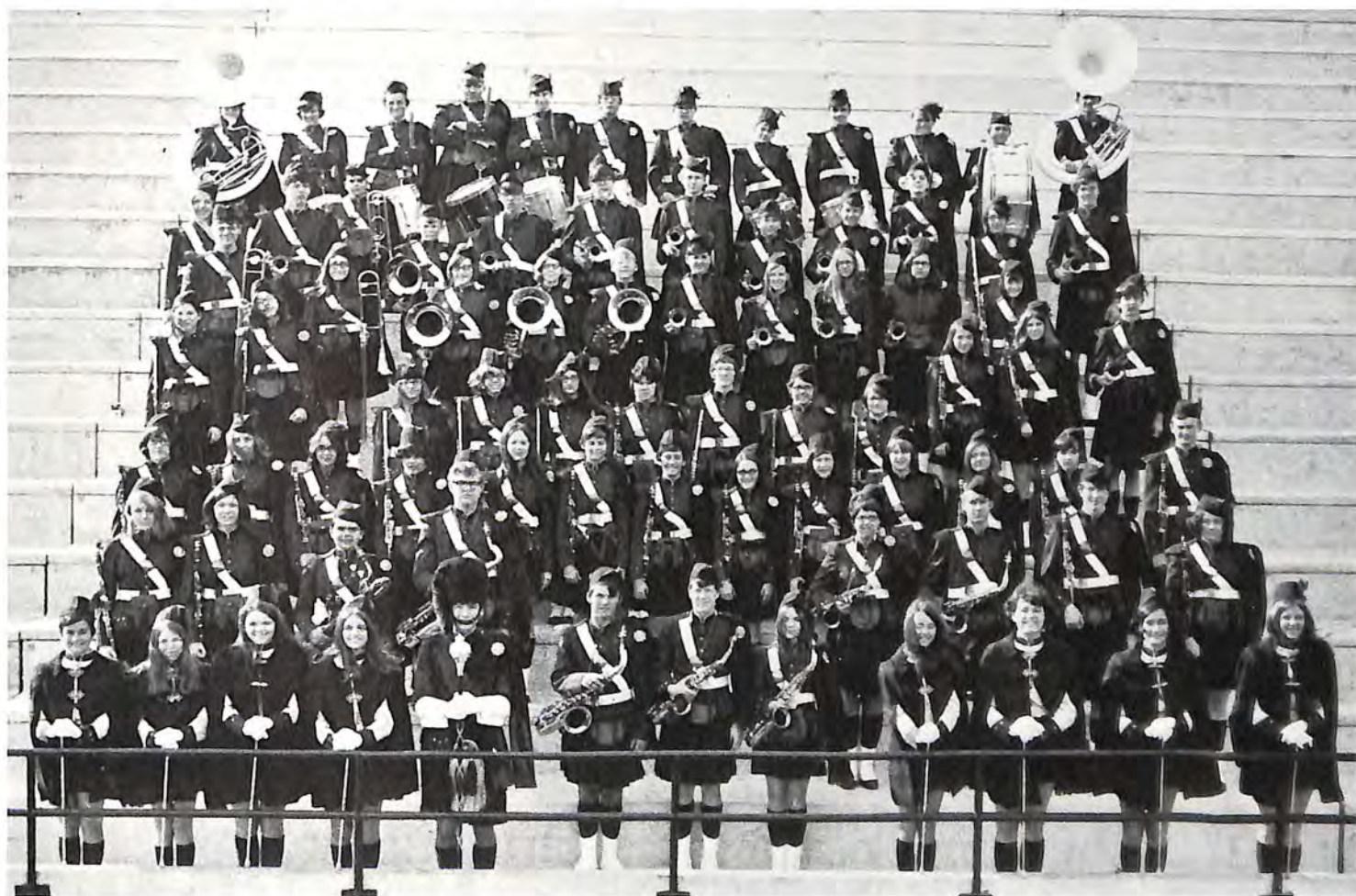

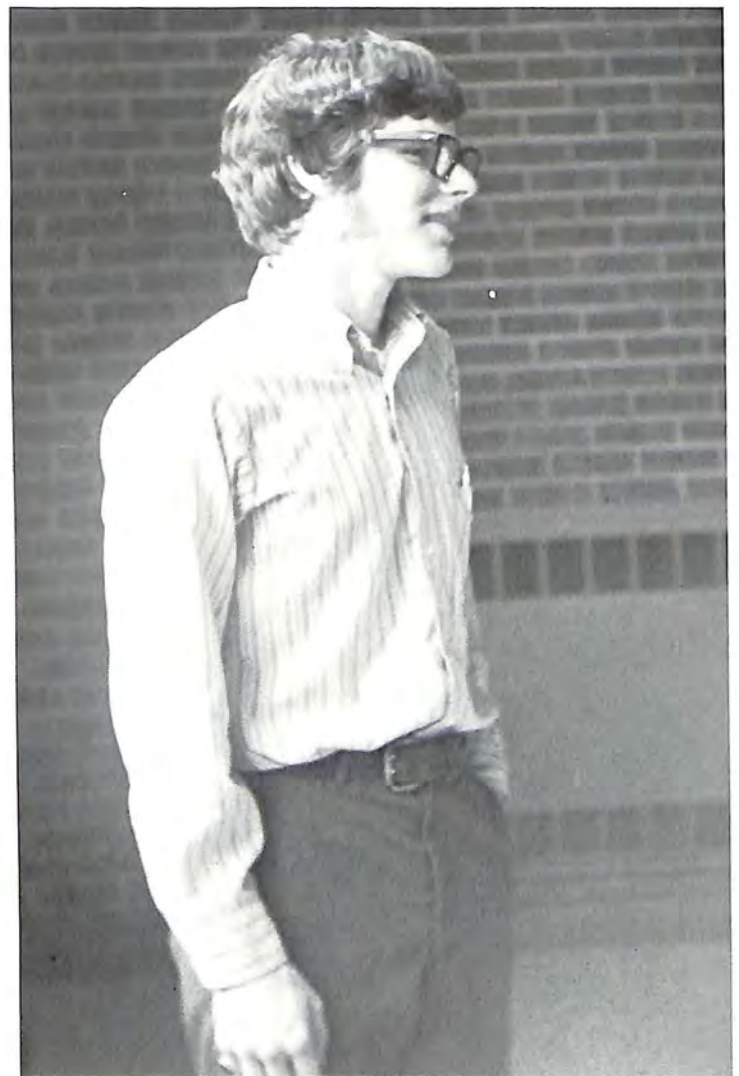

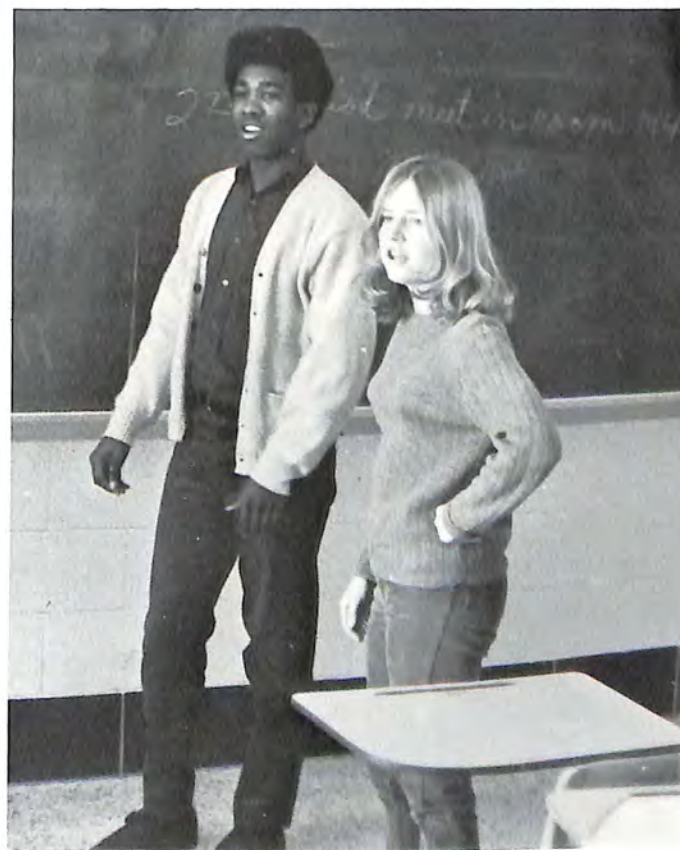

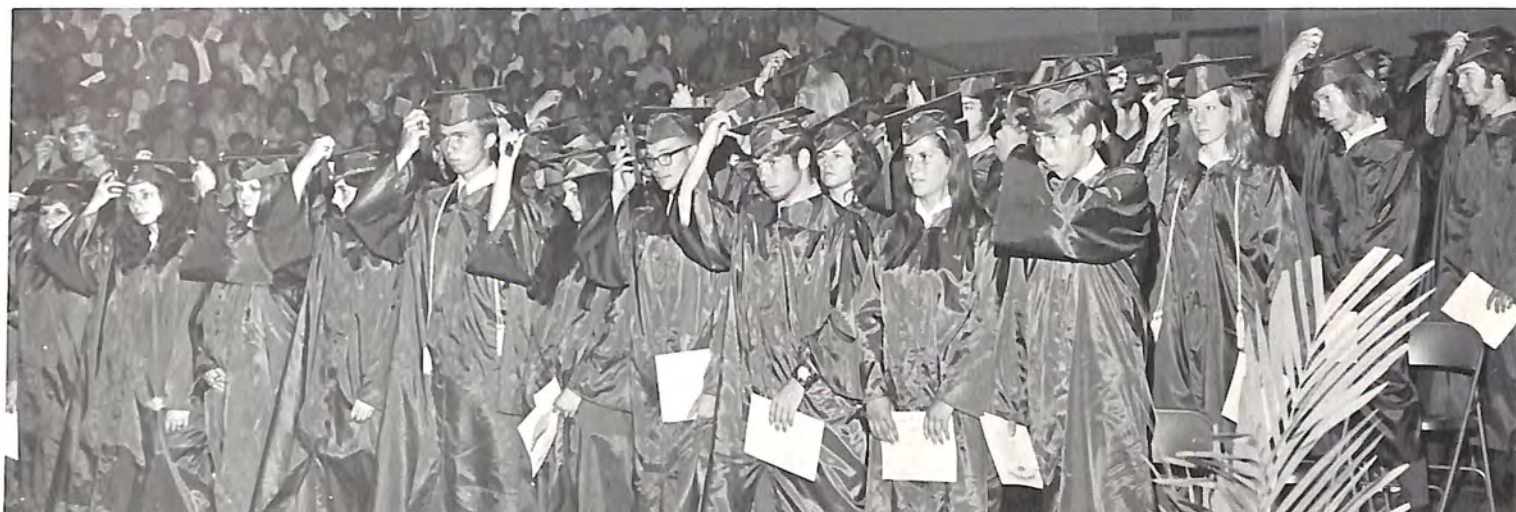
