Genealogical Research in the Virginia Room

The Virginia Room holds Southwestern Virginia's largest collection of genealogical materials. While many of the materials are Virginia specific, states closely associated with Virginia and its people by birth, boundary division, migration, and immigration are also included.

Searching for Resources in the Virginia Room

Published Works

To search the Virginia Room's holdings of published works visit the Roanoke Valley Libraries catalog at www.rvl.info. The catalog may be accessed by any computer or mobile device with internet access. Published works in the collection include family histories, county records, parish and vestry records, military records, county histories and subjects related to local, state and regional history.

From the dropdown menu on the top left of the page, select 'Virginia Room' from the list of library locations. This will limit the search to Virginia Room resources.

Enter search terms into the search box. Terms may include the subject, author, title, word or phrase.

- If no results are generated, try fewer search terms. Sometimes being too specific can eliminate all records.
- If too many results are generated, try to limit the search to more specific phrases.

Unpublished Works

Unpublished works include materials that cannot be searched using the Roanoke Valley Libraries catalog. This includes manuscript collections of genealogical materials, surname files, vertical files, and indexes to publications,

Searching unpublished genealogical collections

Finding aids are the tools used to determine what exists in genealogical collections and organizational records collections. Finding aids to all available collections in the Virginia Room can be searched at www.virginiaroom.org/digital

- 1. All Virginia Room finding aids can be browsed by clicking the 'Finding Aids' link at the top of the homepage.
- Specific subjects can be searched by entering search terms into the search box on the homepage. It is recommended that the 'Advanced Search' function is used and limited to 'Exact Match' if more than one word is used in the search. Using the search box will generate results for not only finding aids, but all items in the digital collection that include a match to the search terms.

This collection consists of Virginia land patents (1623–1774) and land grants (1779–), including land grants within the Northern Neck proprietary (1690–1874) and survey plats and descriptions for the Northern Neck land grants (1786–1874).

<u>Lost Records Localities Digital Collection</u> - https://www.virginiamemory.com/collections/lost
This collection consists of images for a wide variety of court records found as part of chancery and other locality records-processing projects. The images are of surviving records from localities where most records are no longer extant. The original record is scanned and the images are filed together in an artificial online collection—the Lost Records Localities Digital Collection. Please check periodically as this is an ongoing project.

<u>Cohabitation Registers for Virginia Counties</u> - https://tinyurl.com/rtjcxxsb

A cohabitation register, or as it is properly titled, *Register of Colored Persons...cohabiting together as Husband and Wife on 27th February 1866*, was the legal vehicle by which former slaves legitimized both their marriages and their children. The information about an individual person contained in a cohabitation register is literally priceless as it is often the first time that a former slave appeared officially in the public record and because of the extensive kinds of information that the register recorded. Though recorded at the local level, registers may not exist for every county in Virginia.

<u>Confederate Disability Applications</u> - https://lva-virginia.libguides.com/confederate-disability
This collection consists of certificates submitted by injured veterans to the Virginia Board of Commissioners on Artificial Limbs. Injured soldiers submitted certificates from their county court stating that they were Virginia citizens, that they had been disabled in the war, and what assistance they required.

<u>Confederate Pension Applications, Veterans and Widows</u> - https://lva-virginia.libguides.com/confederate-pensions

This collection consists of pension applications and amended applications filed by resident Virginians who served in the Confederate military and their widows, as well as more than 500 enslaved and free Blacks who labored as cooks, herdsmen, laborers, servants, or teamsters.

Revolutionary War Bounty Land Claims - https://lva-virginia.libguides.com/bounty-claims
The collection consists of images of application files for military bounty land. Related bounty land certificate files are indexed, but not imaged. Following a 1779 legislative act, the state offered bounty lands for Revolutionary War military service. To qualify, a Virginia soldier or sailor had to serve at least three years continuously in the Continental or state forces. No bounty land was given by the state for militia service.

Between 1777 and 1785, the Virginia General Assembly passed several laws authorizing pensions for disabled soldiers and for widows of soldiers who died while on active duty. This collection of 646 pension files provides digital images of the documents submitted for pension claims.

This collection of text and images features entire works, as well as selected title pages, frontispieces, illustrations, plats, maps, and designs from the pages of the Rare Book Collection. The Rare Book Collection houses 51,700 titles focused on the history and formation of Virginia, early Virginia imprints, and also includes other diverse topics that span the 16th through the 21st centuries such as agriculture, architecture, botany, customs and trades, genealogy, law, mathematics, natural history, theology, and the history of our state and the nation.
