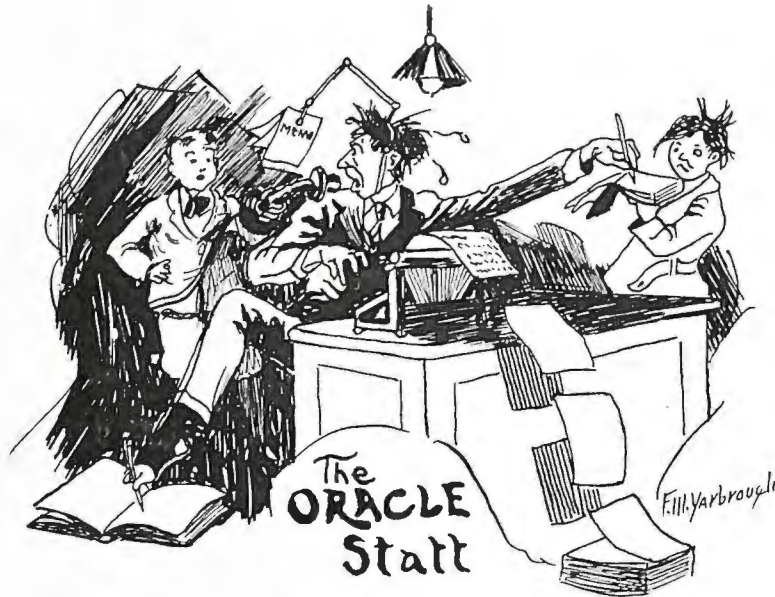

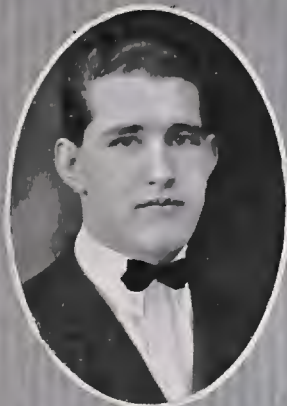

Home Economics Department

The Department of Home Economics in the Salem Schools was first established in the grammar school, through the generosity of Mrs. S. H. McVitty, about eight years ago. In 1921 it was moved to the high school, where in the spring of 1922 an attempt was made to organize the members of the classes into a club. In May, 1923, it was decided to name the club the Lucy Winton McVitty Club, in honor of Mrs. S. H. McVitty.

As a club, though not conspicuous, our activities grow out of needs presented by school life. Before Christmas we made and filled stockings for the poor. We had a social meeting of the club February 14, to which the faculty and parents were invited. During the winter months hot lunch, supplementary, was served once a week. We gave our time and energy one Saturday to the Athletic Association and served the agriculture boys a supper March 7. On April 4 the club sponsored a minstrel show, the proceeds going toward the expenses of the department and a first aid kit.



HOME ECONOMICS CLUB

Vocational Agriculture

MR. A. T. LEWARK, *Instructor*

This course, as outlined below, makes provision for four years of secondary grade work, and offers a well-rounded course, since one-half of the time is devoted to the academic, or non-vocational subjects.

The vocational work averages about three hours per day for nine months, though part of this time may be put in on the supervised project carried out on the home farm. This project must be conducted through a period of at least six months, though it is highly desirable that it continue through twelve months.

The supervised project each year must be related to the subject matter studied for that year; for instance, since the vocational work for the first year is Plant Production, the project for this year is a Plant Production project; the second year it must be an Animal Husbandry project. Each year in which farm shop is taught the work is correlated with the agricultural subjects studied.

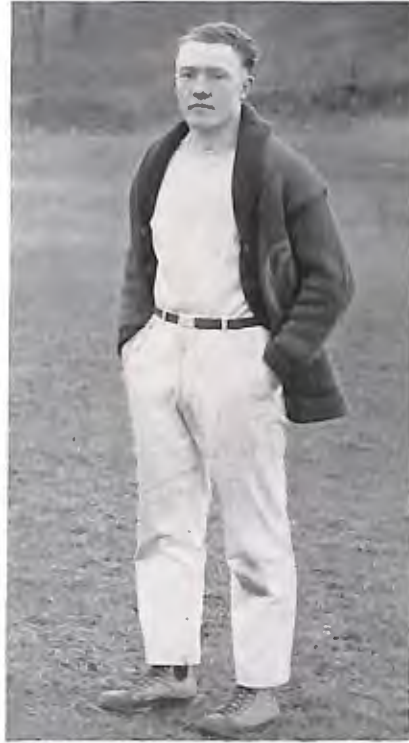

The membership was good this year, but it could have been better. The Senior Class was the only one to reach the hundred per cent mark. However, the other classes came very near going over the top. With the co-operation and support of the entire student body, the Athletic Association next year should do even more efficient work in promoting athletics.

Coach Kibler has been with us two years, and in that time he has achieved great success in training strong, representative teams of Salem High. As a result of his efforts, athletics has taken new life, and the first girls' basket ball team since 1918 has been organized.

Better and clean athletics are expected in future years under our efficient coach.

Football

The first game of the year confirmed the belief of many that Salem High was to have a great football season. The initial fray was with the Roanoke College Junior Varsity team and ended 25 to 0 for Salem.

Randolph-Macon Academy was the next to fall. The game was played in Bedford and the score was 27 to 0.

The following week we met the strong Dublin team in Salem and had a tough time keeping them from crossing the thin white line. Our motto or battle cry was, "They shall not score!" and it was the determination to uphold the motto that made Salem fight and hold Dublin on the two yard line for four downs, after one of their men had gotten away with a long pass and placed the ball within scoring distance. When the four downs were up, the ball was on the seven yard line instead of the two. Denit punted out to safety. In this game, Wilborne, star halfback and captain, suffered a dislocated shoulder, and was forced to remain out for the rest of the season. Sherertz was then elected captain for the rest of the year.

By defeating Blacksburg the next Saturday, the team annexed another scoreless victory. Blacksburg put up a stubborn resistance, but could not withstand the continuous plunges of the Salem backs, and the result was: Salem 14, Blacksburg 0.

The next game was with Bristol and was to decide the championship of the Fifth District, each team having eliminated all other contestants in their respective sections. The game was played in Salem, and Bristol opened up with a rush that scored a touchdown in the first half. Two successful passes in the second quarter were responsible for the counter. Bristol displayed heady and scrappy football, while Salem seemed to lack the proper charging ability and to be playing too much on the defensive. However, when the second half opened, it seemed like there was an entirely new team on the field. The boys were a little shaken by the fact that a team had crossed their goal line. In fact they were mad about it and determined to go back and show that crew from Bristol how to play football. The characteristic punch was back, and in a little time Salem shoved the ball across Bristol's line. The score was now 6 to 6, both teams failing in the try for point. The remainder of the game was a fight, both teams putting out everything they had, and Salem threatened to score again towards the last. The ball was carried to Bristol's five yard line and lost, after a failure by half a foot to make the necessary distance on four downs. The game ended with the championship unsettled.

The following week Salem defeated Christiansburg High in Salem by the score of 25 to 0.

Once more Salem and Bristol battled to a tie, this time in Bristol. This game was another real fight, but Salem had the edge and threatened to score three different times, while their own goal line was never in real danger. In the last of the first half, Haislip intercepted a Bristol pass in the middle of the field and ran to the five yard line before being thrown. The tackle was a flying leap from behind and caught Haislip around the ankles. Four downs to make five yards! It looked like Salem had to score. Two downs and two feet to go! There could be no doubt. Then the whistle blew and the half was over. The whistle saved Bristol that day. Salem worked the ball close enough in the last half to try a place kick and a drop kick, but both failed, and the game was another tie—0 to 0.

The final game which decided the championship was played in Roanoke and was a heart-breaker for Salem. The team was not in proper condition to play another hard game so soon, and it seemed like the boys lacked confidence. It was the worst game of the season for Salem, and we made a very poor showing, losing by the score of 18 to 0. It cannot be said that Bristol did not put up a good fight, for they played a fine, consistent game all the way through and deserved to win. It was Salem's first and only defeat, and out of eight games played during the season she was scored on by only one team.

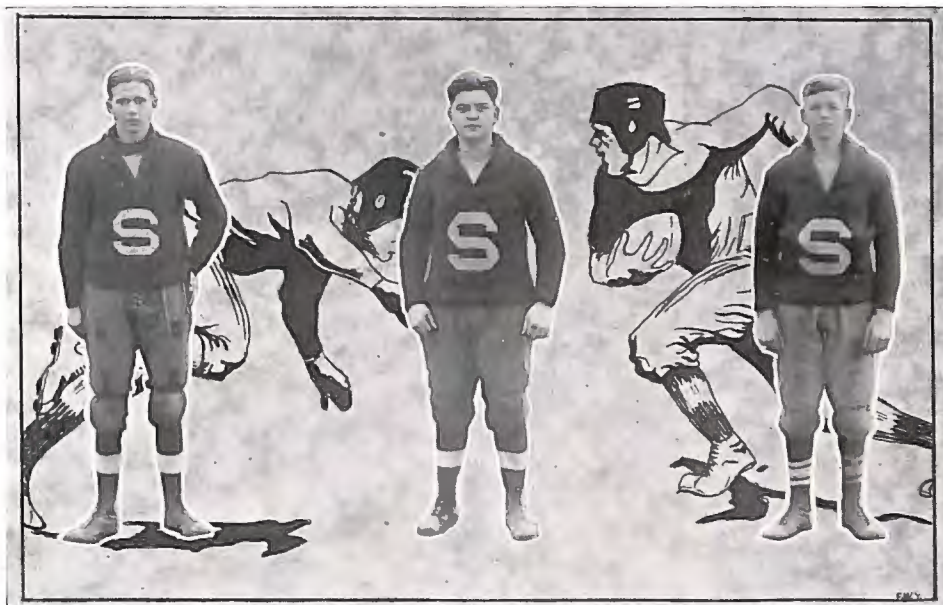

PAUL COPENHAVER—*Quarterback*

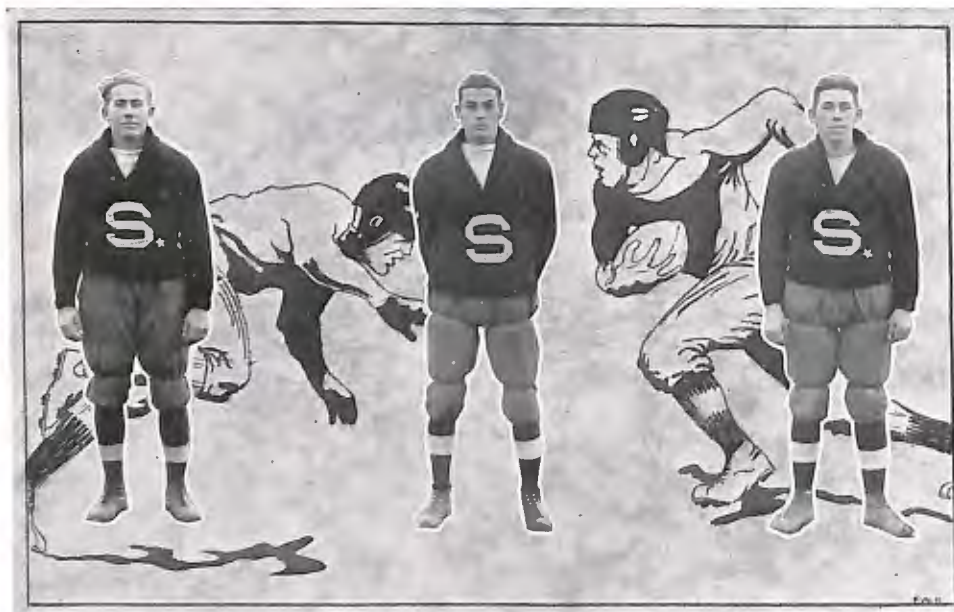
5 ft. 6 in.—120 lbs.

National Business College played Salem Hi girls in Salem. Both teams fought hard and Salem girls won their first game by a score of 18 to 4.

A return game was played with Bedford in Salem. The first half of this game was "nip and tuck," the score being 7 to 7. In the last half Salem girls fought in earnest and were rewarded by winning 17 to 10.

A trip to Rocky Mount was made. The game was hard fought by both teams, but Salem seemed to be outclassed and Rocky Mount, having the added advantage of playing on her floor, won 18 to 8.

Vinton Hi was played in Vinton. This was a very close game, the opponents winning 12 to 10.

This game closed the season for Salem. Although from the official standpoint it was not a very successful one, we feel that the team has made good, considering the new and inexperienced material with which the coach was confronted, and we feel that much credit is due to the splendid coaching the girls received. An excellent team is anticipated for next year, since all the members of the regular squad this year are "underclassmen."

One of the most important of all the school organizations is the Lyceum, organized in Salem High School in September, 1896.

The Lyceum is a literary society intended to make the pupils proficient in literary work such as reading, debating, public speaking, reciting, etc.

The increasing number of pupils necessitates a division of the Lyceum; the Senior Lyceum for students of Senior High School and the Junior Lyceum for the Junior section. All pupils attend the meetings which are held on Wednesday of every other week, and each pupil participates on the program during the school year.

The benefits derived from this phase of school activities are many. The literary ability of each member is cultivated and improved to the extent that some have succeeded in obtaining State honors. The debating team of last year was awarded the honor of being second best in the State. A Salem High pupil won first place in the State reading contest, and the representative sent to the Emory and Henry Declamation Contest came back with second honors. It is hoped that meetings of this worthy organization can be held more frequently and that Salem High may continue to win literary laurels in the future as she has done in the past.

The Glee Club

The Glee Club, while one of the youngest organizations in the school, from the standpoint of years, has increased greatly. There are more voices than in previous years. An earnestness of purpose and interest, coupled with a real love of music, marks all of its work and has made this band of singers a real asset not only to the school, but to the community as well.

In the fall of each year the Club gives a musical play. This increases the interest of the pupils very much. In the spring, at commencement time, there is a concert given by the Glee Club which adds very much to the commencement exercises.

This year music has become more a regular study in the school because regular class periods of forty minutes are devoted to music. There are three sections of the Glee Club, which include all of the members of the high school grades. The Seniors and Juniors have a period, the Sophomores one period, and the Freshmen, or Eighth Grade, one period a week.

A short time after mid-term examinations a contest was held between the Senior, Junior and the Sophomore sections. The Sophomore section won by a very few points. A male quartet was organized in the Sophomore section by the director.

Later in life, when we use all we have studied, if to that knowledge we have added music, one of the arts, we shall find ourselves lifted to a higher plane, and our course of usefulness greater. Through it we shall bring joy, happiness and comfort to others.

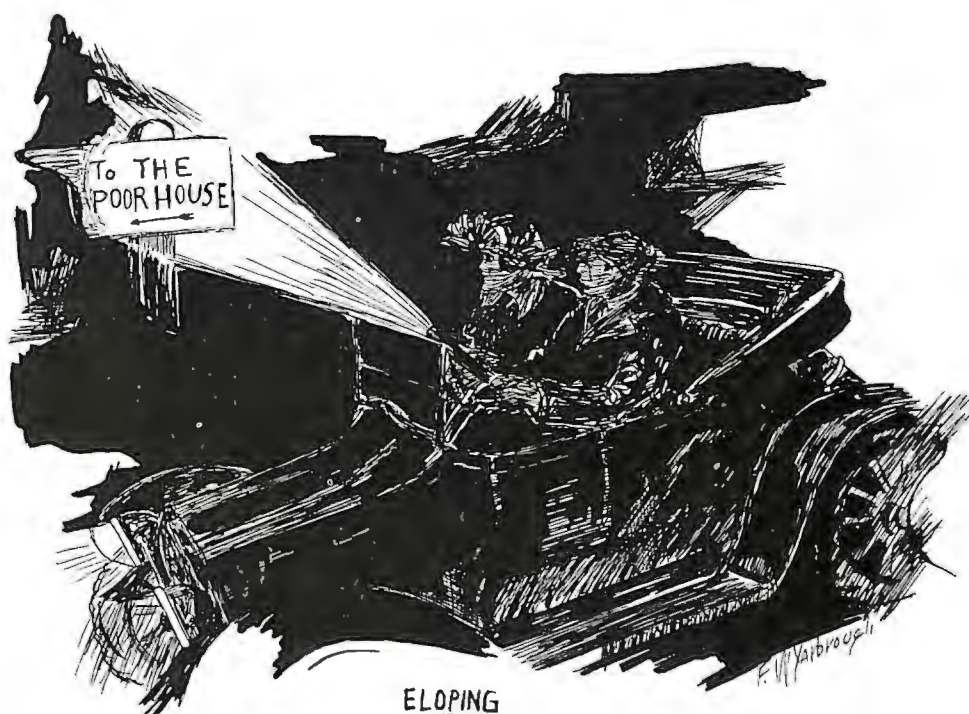
