Vocational Agriculture

MR. A. T. LEWARK, *Instructor*

This course, as outlined below, makes provision for four years of secondary grade work, and offers a well-rounded course, since one-half of the time is devoted to the academic, or non-vocational subjects.

The vocational work averages about three hours per day for nine months, though part of this time may be put in on the supervised project carried out on the home farm. This project must be conducted through a period of at least six months, though it is highly desirable that it continue through twelve months.

The supervised project each year must be related to the subject matter studied for that year; for instance, since the vocational work for the first year is Plant Production, the project for this year is a Plant Production project; the second year it must be an Animal Husbandry project. Each year in which farm shop is taught the work is correlated with the agricultural subjects studied.

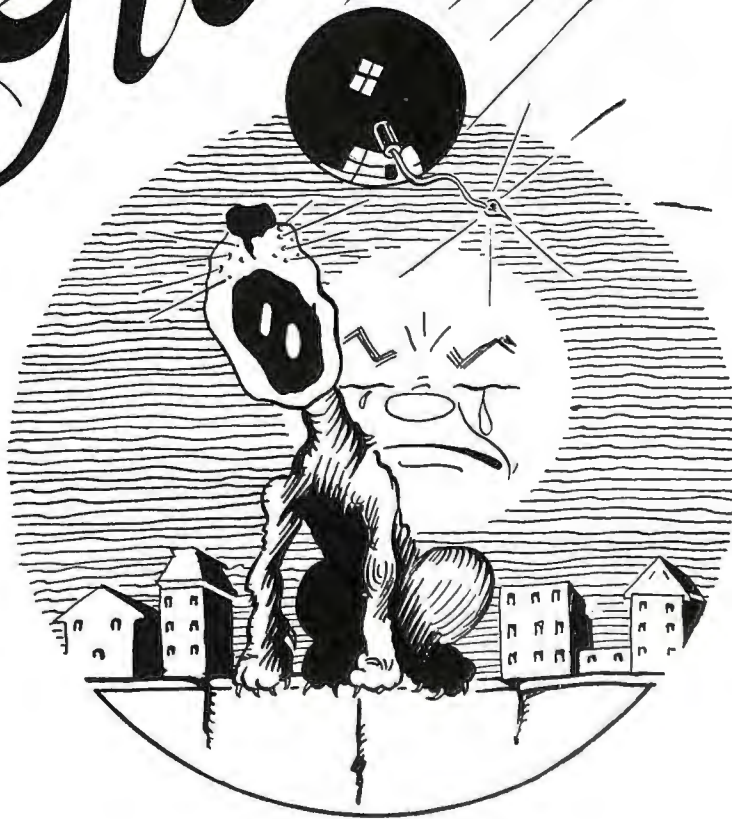

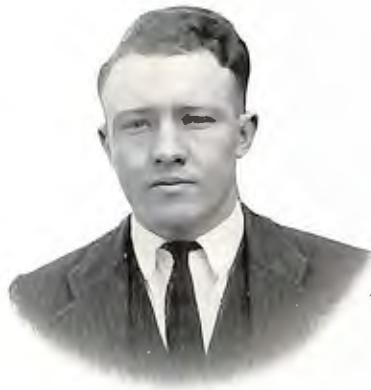

The following week we closed the season with a scoreless game. Dublin fought hard, and neither team was able to score, so the season was closed with one tie game, one defeat, and four victories.

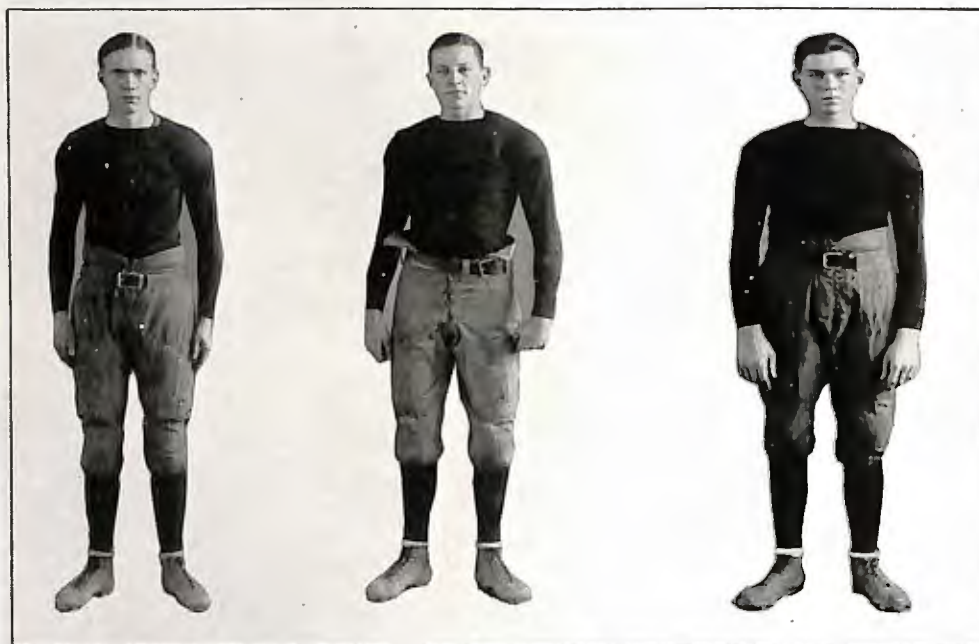

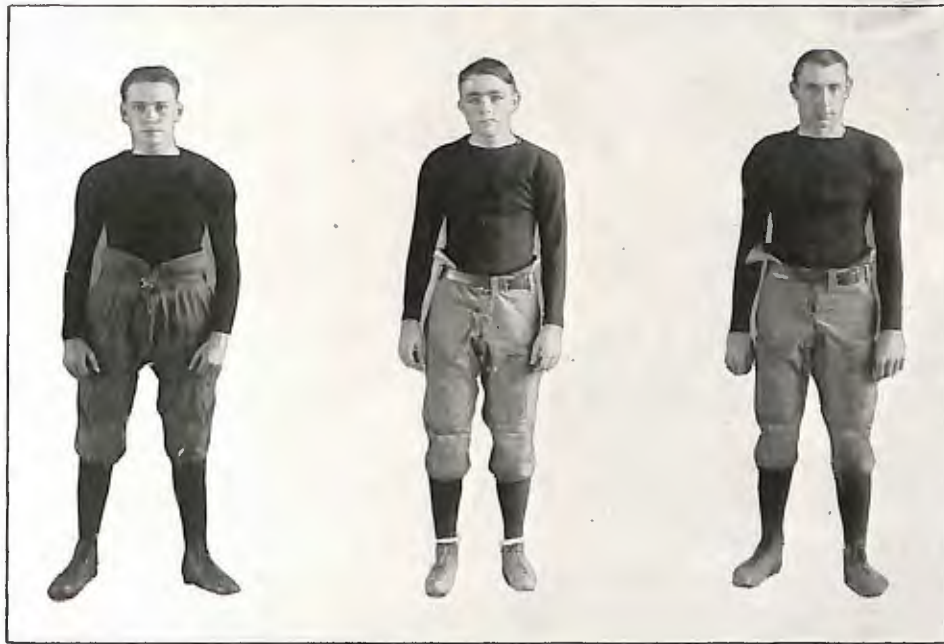

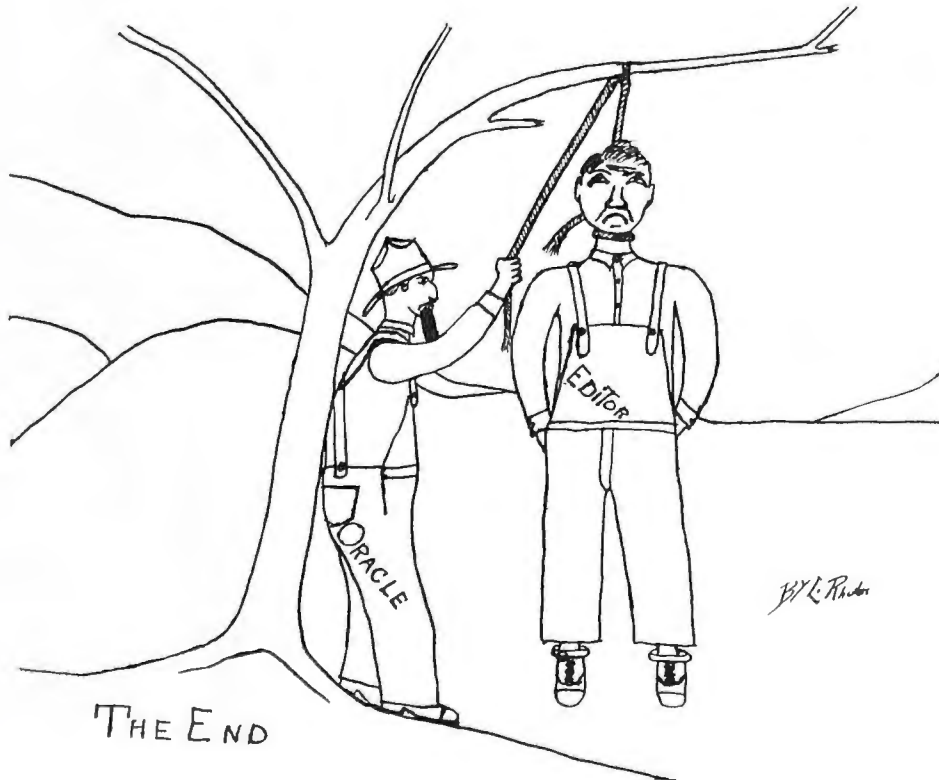
