
Cavaliers End Season With 5-5 Record

The Cavalier defense held their opponents to just 102 points in 10 games, three of which were shutouts. This enabled the team to place 2nd in the Roanoke Valley right behind Andrew Lewis of Salem. Mark Cole led the team with 182 defensive points, and Dean Wertz, Mike Goad, and Larry Gray showed their defensive worth by being named to the Blue Ridge District First Team Defense. Cole, Wertz, Hodges, and Gray also received honors on the Roanoke Valley Area team. And the defense could always rely on the "Mad Stork", Mike Poole.

Their passing averaged over 150 yards a game. Dean Wertz and Mike Goad placed first and second, respectively, in the team's rushing, and Larry Gray was called on when short yardage up the middle was needed. Mark Woodie, who was named to the First Team Blue Ridge District Offense, lead the Cavalier offensive line which enabled the backs to break into the clear for the score.










Cavaliers End Season 2nd in Valley

Carl Johnson, a 6'3" center, who is as good on defense as he is on offense, pulled down an average of 11.5 defensive rebounds and blocked 5 shots per game. Forward Mike Poole was a strong rebounder and a highly under-rated player. Another forward, Willie Simmons, added a solid rebounder on the right side.





Although the team as a whole had only a few wins, the individual effort of few was outstanding. Larry Gray was the only person in the district to draw with Philips from Covington, who has never been pinned. Allen Arney, only 98 pounds but every inch wrestling muscle, and Gary Drewry pinned the best in their weight classes.











Thirty strokes ahead of their nearest opponents, the '71 Golf Team finished in first place in the Blue Ridge title match and brought home Lord Botetourt's only district championship for '70-'71. 






Baseball Team Better Than Scores Indicate







During the year, the club took trips to Hollins College, Roanoke College, and Virginia Western Community College.





"A dream becomes a reality." Botetourt County's long-awaited Vocational School opened in September to serve Lord Botetourt and James River students who plan to seek employment immediately following graduation from high school. Students in grades ten through twelve traveled to Fincastle daily for a three-hour session in a variety of fields.

Course offerings included Drafting, Industrial Maintenance Mechanics, Automotive Mechanics, Building Trades, Home Economics and Wage Earning, and a three year program in Cosmetology. Automotive Mechanics provided a training program for developing skills needed to inspect, diagnose, repair, and adjust automotive vehicles, and Building Trades taught the skills involved in construction of buildings,

including experience in masonry, electrical wiring, plumbing, and carpentry. Cosmetology students ventured into the world of hair and skin care, and students who complete the course may qualify for state licensing. Drafting students learned to read and understand drawings, use equipment of the profession, execute specialized drawing procedures, food preparation, sewing, and child care were the concerns of Home Economics, and graduates of the course are prepared for positions in food preparation, alterer's helper, and the like. A Cluster of trades — hydraulus fluidics, welding, machine trades — trained students in Maintenance Mechanics to obtain a secure position in industry.
