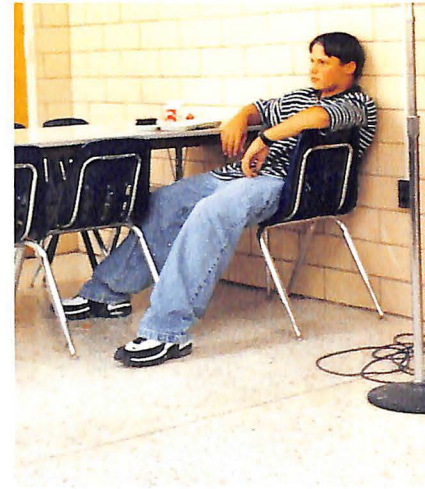

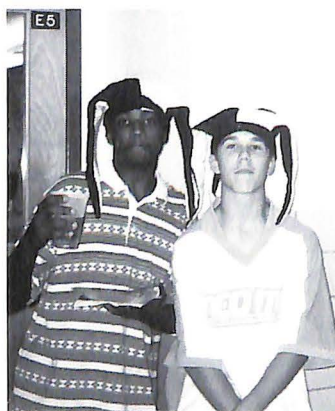

Have you ever wondered about the academic standards and Standards Of Learning (SOL's) for Northside Middle School? What exactly are the standards? Do they ever change? What kind of test must be passed to get through the eighth grade? What are the study skills videos during Teacher Advisory for? Heather Marks asked Assistant Principal Susan McIntosh these questions.

The Class of 2002 is the first

class required to pass the SOL tests to get out of the eighth grade. The SOL's are academic standards set by the state. Academic standards are specific objectives deemed necessary for understanding each subject. There are separate standards for each academic and some electives.

Ms. McIntosh says the study skills videos shown during Teacher Advisory this year were meant to assist students with organizational

skills, and giving ideas on when, where, and how to study. The videos also offered shortcuts for doing homework and making improvements in study skills.

Northside Middle School is focused on teaching students how to learn and instilling study habits that will stick with students for life.

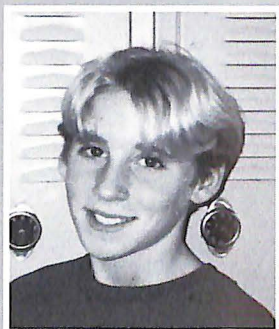

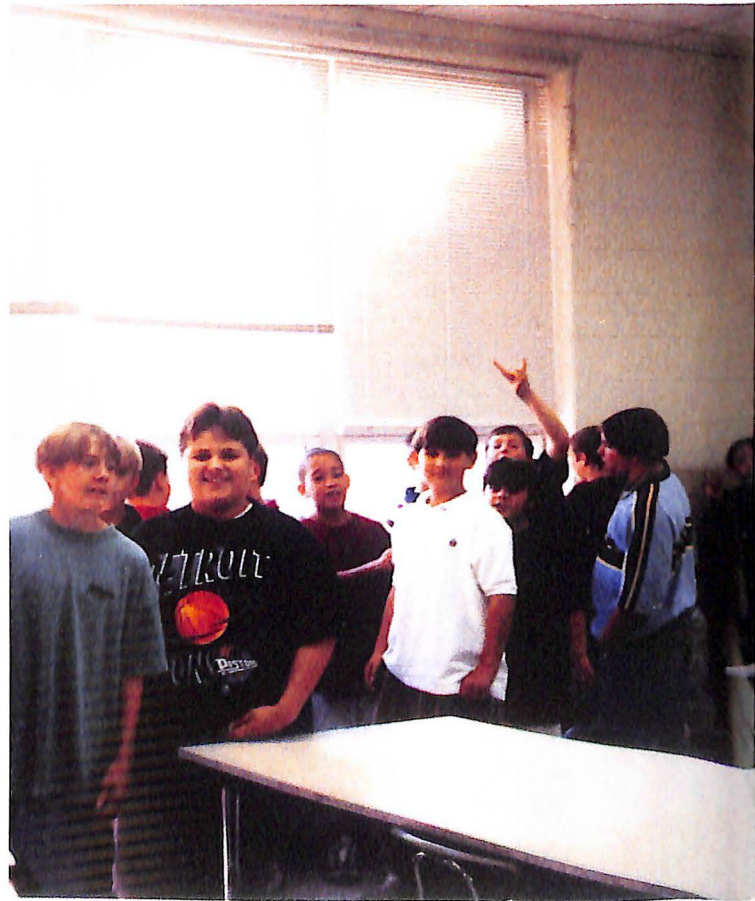

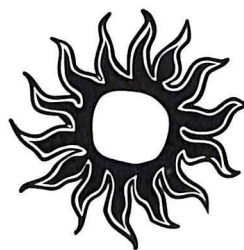

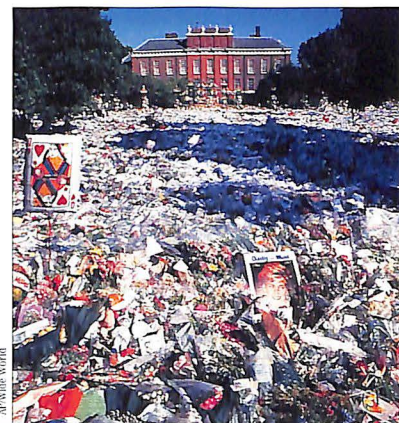

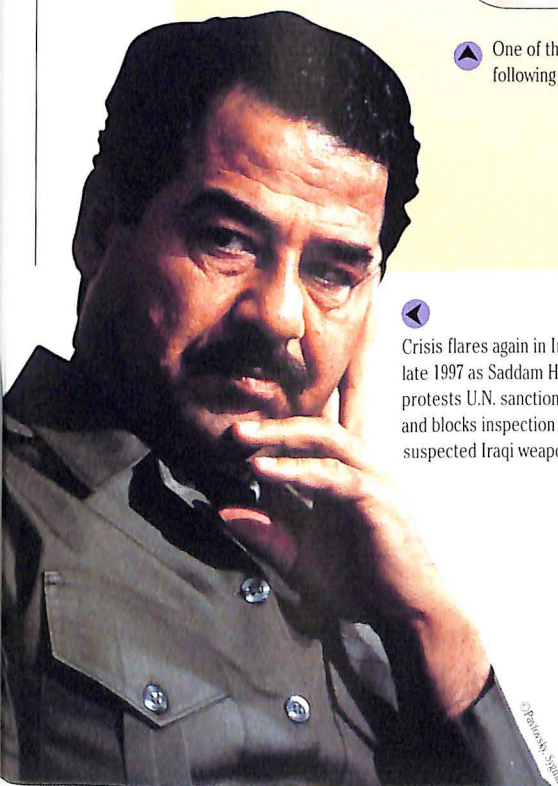

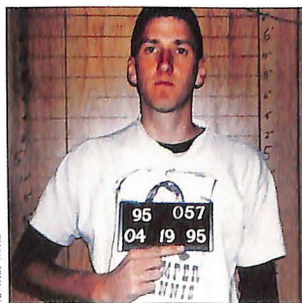

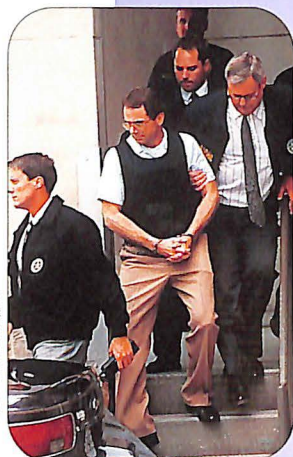

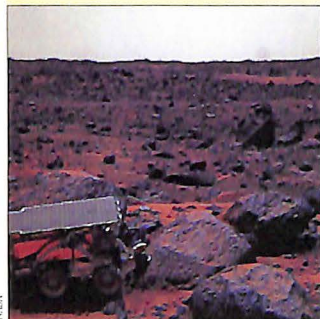

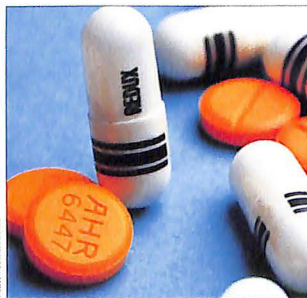

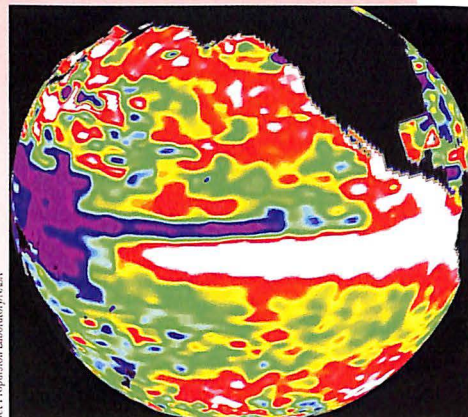

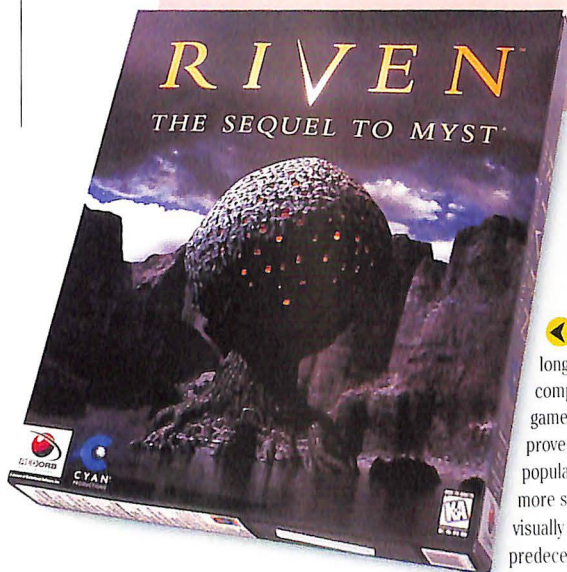

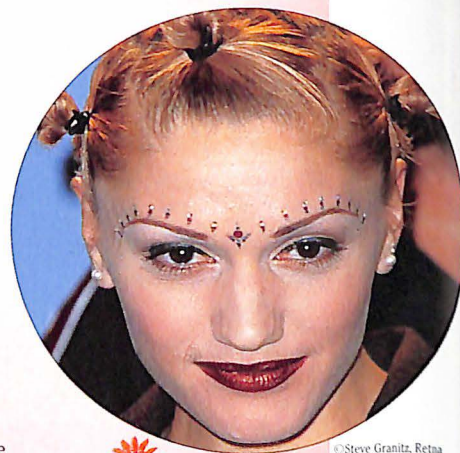

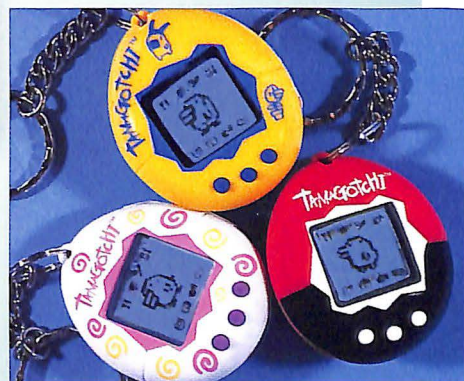

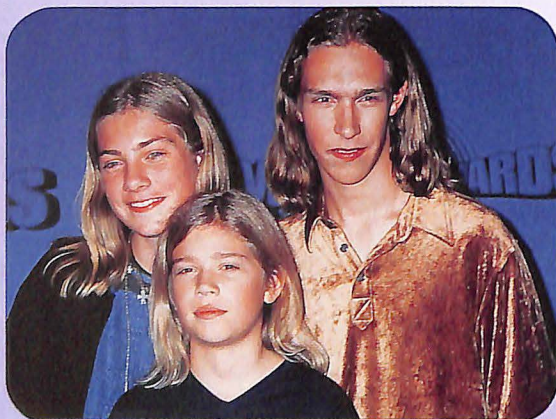

Coach Hicks says this team was different from others in the past because no player came in and expected to be a star.

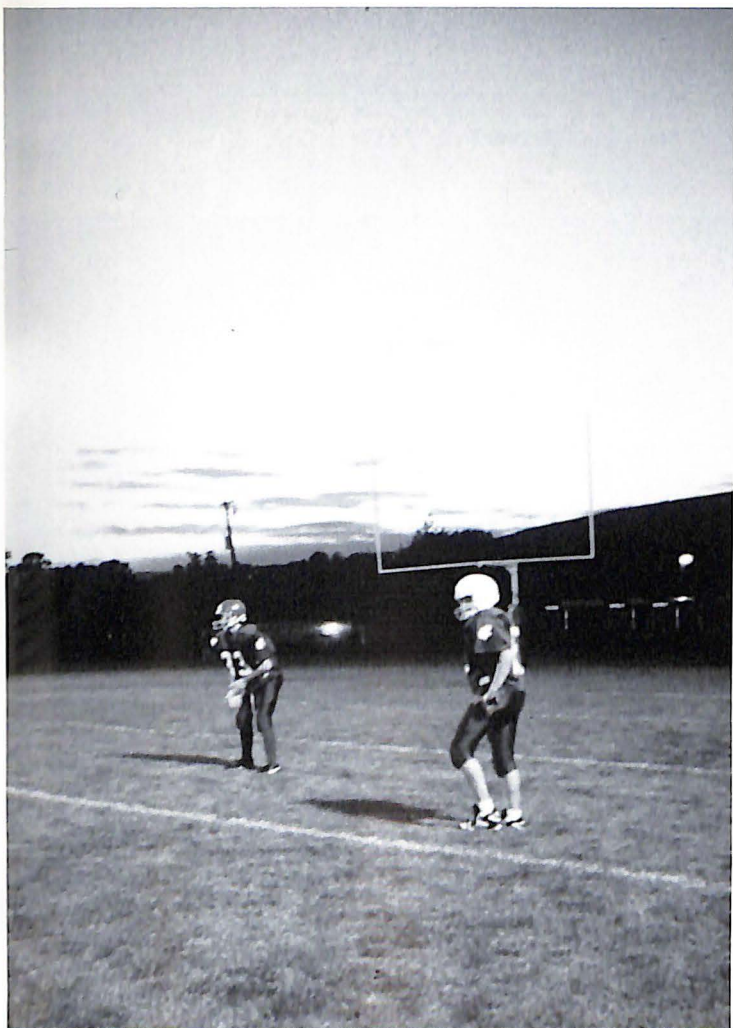
When asked how he felt about the team he said, "This team was made up of hard workers. They were attentive, learned quickly, and adjusted easily to changes."

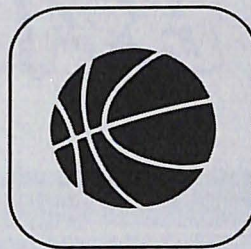

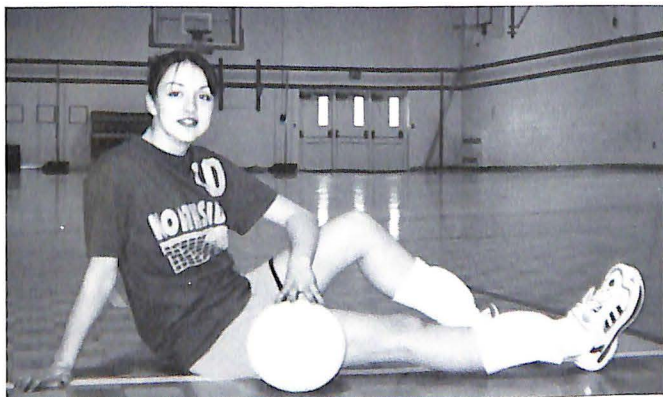


Jessica Wilkerson, #13, gets ready for her approach to spike the volleyball as her teammates are preparing for the defense.

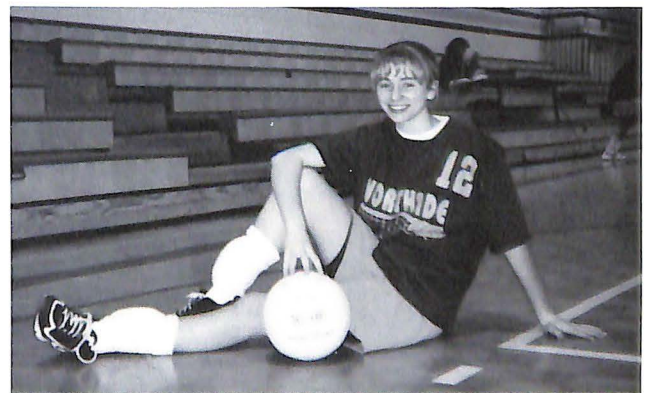

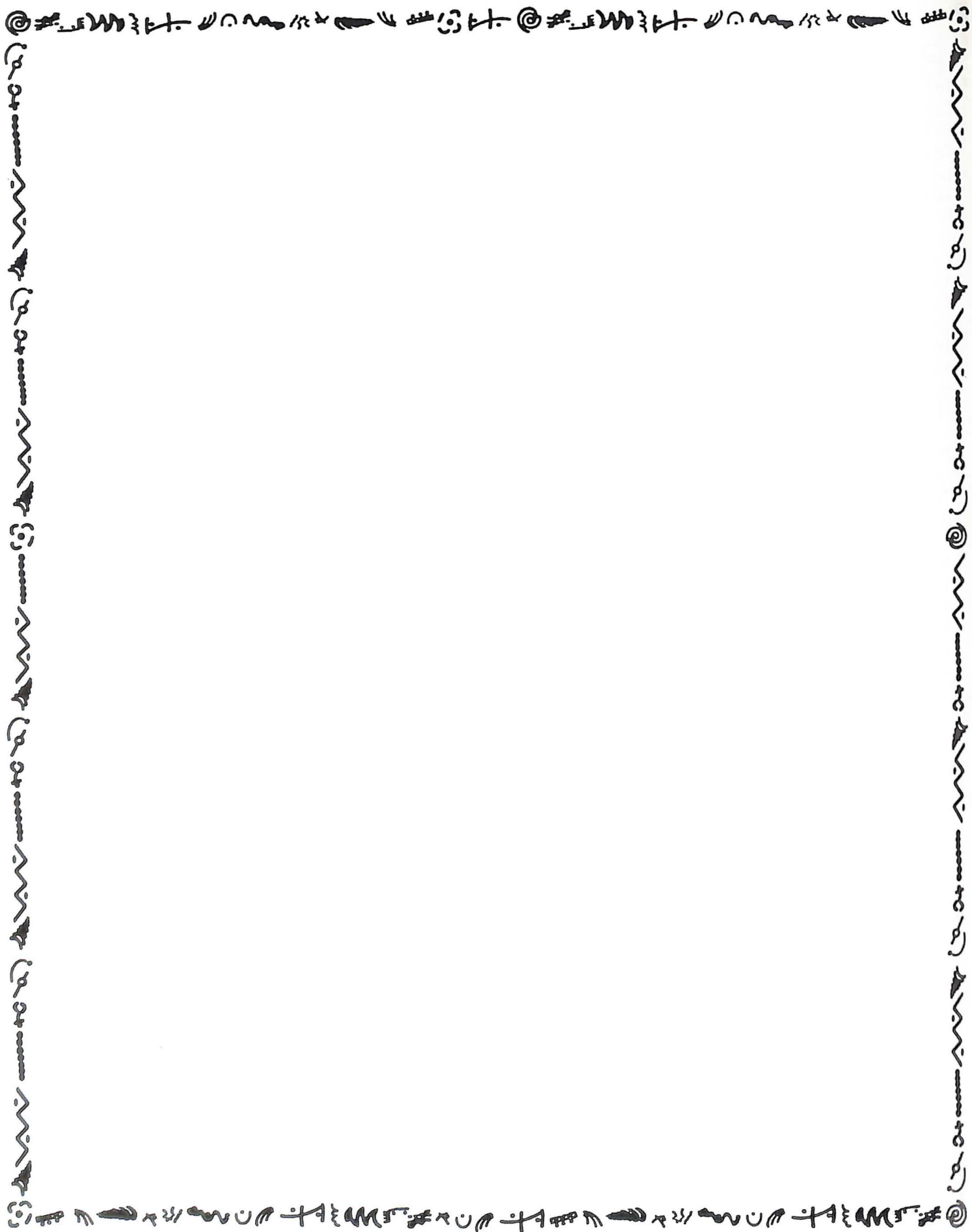

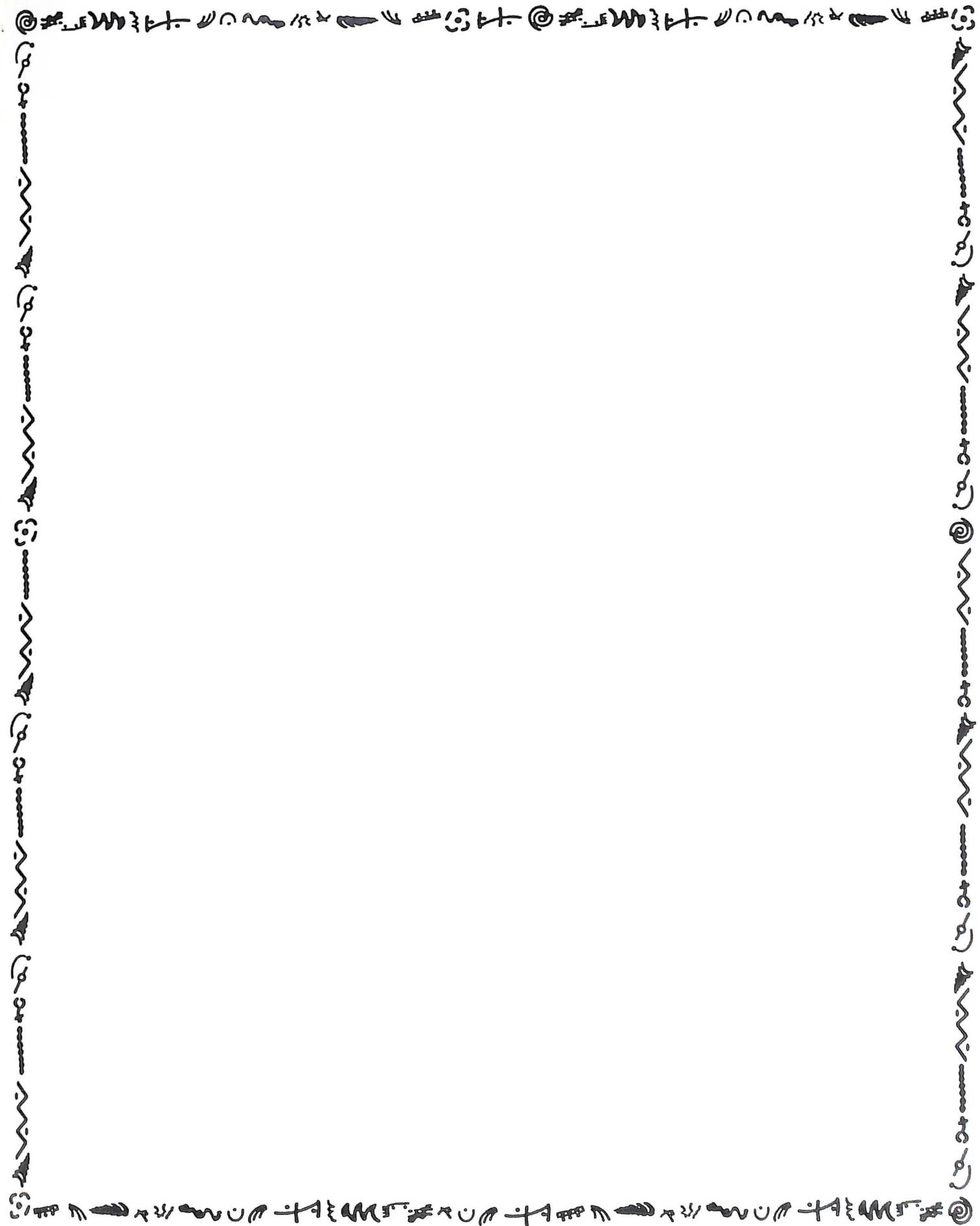
