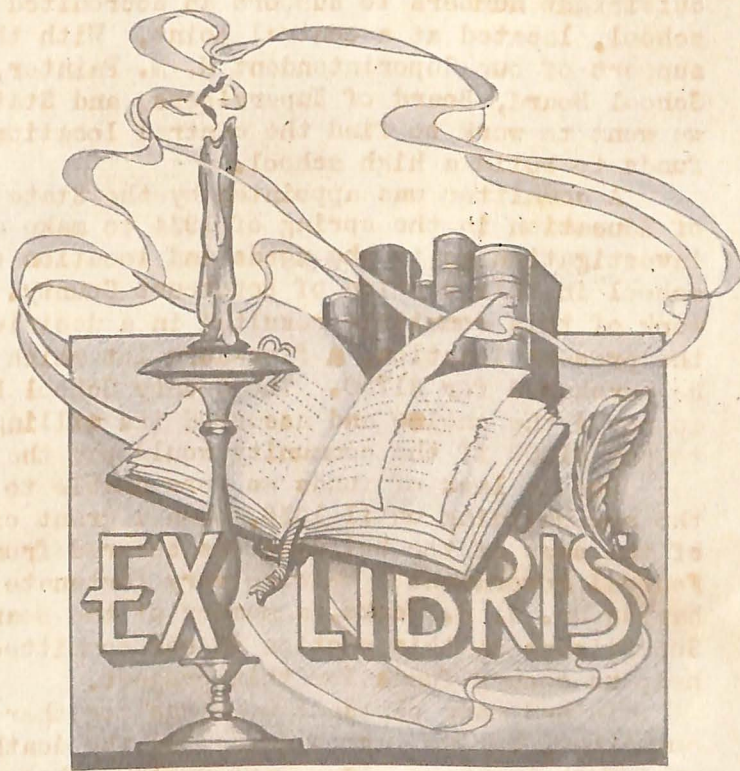

This committee found that due to the number of pupils enrolled in school in this vicinity and high school pupils at Troutville, Roanoke, and Montvale out of this section of the county, there were sufficient numbers to support an accredited high school, located at a central point. With the support of our Superintendent H. M. Painter, the School Board, Board of Supervisors, and State Aid we went to work to find the central location and funds to build a high school.

A committee was appointed by the State Board of Education in the spring of 1934 to make an investigation as to the needs and location of a school in this section of Botetourt County. The work of this committee resulted in a decision on the present location, a five-acre lot which could be purchased for \$1750. The County School Board approved the choice and asserted its willingness to pay \$1000 if the community would pay the balance.

Due to lack of funds we were unable to start the new building until 1938, when a grant of 45% of the cost of the building was secured from the Federal government. We were very fortunate in having Mr. H. E. Weeks, a member of the Board of Supervisors in this section on our committee to help us secure funds for this project.

We had many pleasant meetings together as a committee, but we were saddened by the death of one of the members, Mr. W. P. Dooley, whose place was filled by Mr. Lewis C. Wilkes. As a committee we are very grateful for the cooperation of the people and the boards of our county for our splendid Colonial High School.

The students were asked to name the school and their unanimous choice was Colonial. The building was dedicated on August 30, 1939. The dedicatory address was delivered by the late E. Lee Trinkle, Ex-governor of Virginia.

BEGINNING OF COLONIAL HIGH SCHOOL

The progressive dynamic developing system of consolidated high schools in Botetourt County caught the imagination of the leaders of the county. The ambition of the leaders was to translate the Laymantown grade school section into high school action. First a possibility, then a reality, and finally an accomplished fact.

From January 16, 1934, the possibilities of the possibilities of this section of Botetourt County were discussed. The committee was appointed with Zimmerman, W. P. Doolittle, and others.

From January 19, 1934, the committee was appointed with Zimmerman, W. P. Doolittle, J. P. Garrison, E. L. Murray, and others. This committee was appointed to work with the Blue Ridge committee. At a joint meeting of the two committees, W. C. Smiley was appointed as chairman and R. M. Foster as secretary. It was further decided that these committees would no longer be two committees, but one and all interested would be neutral and would work together for the interest of both committees. (See page 4.)

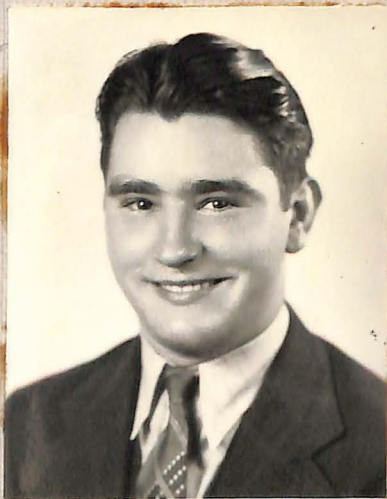

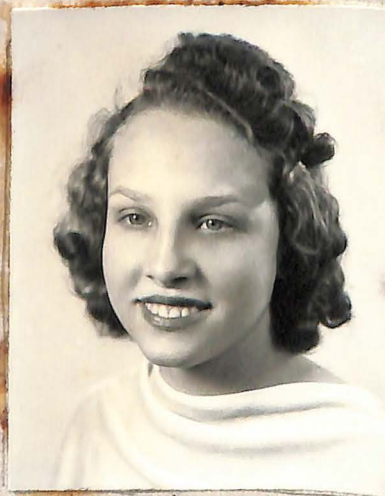

CLASS HISTORY

One morning in September, 1929, many shy but expectant six-year-olds proudly entered the portals of Botetourt County Schools, where, soon adjusting themselves to their new environment, spent many happy years.

In the fall of 1936 these students were introduced into the freshman year of high school. Each year was filled with memories that can never be forgotten.

September 7, 1939, found us at our new school, Colonial, as seniors, but not at all dignified as we had expected. The first highlight of this memorable year was the election of Paul Foster as our president.

Our class was well represented in the journalistic activities with Charles Wade as editor of THE SENTINEL, and Paul Foster as editor of THE COLONEL.

On April 24, Colonial footlights flashed on the first play of the year, "The Path Across the Hill". The music department returned from the County Music Festival with second rating.

"Full of Youth" our senior play, presented on May 24, was the grand finale of the years stage productions.

Class Night was on May 30. Then passing through the final exams with more or less ease, we came to June 5--Commencement--a day which will live long in the heart of every senior. Other dates we may forget, but nothing will dim the memory of that night when each of us received his diploma as a member of the class of 1940.

And speaking of prisons, Lillian Wilkes is chief cook at Alcatraz, where Mickey is residing. Both board at the government's expense.

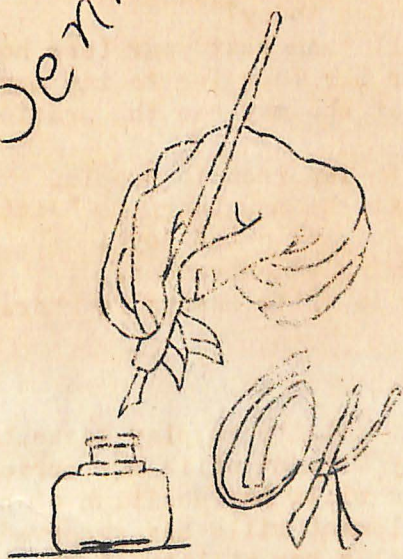

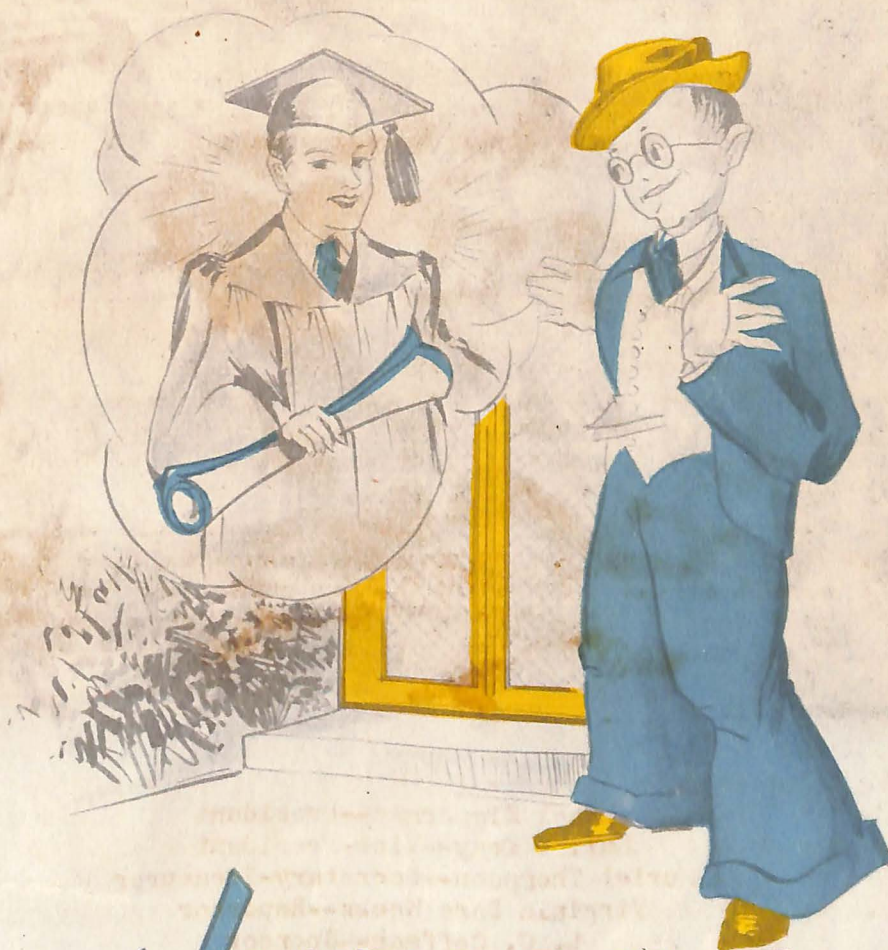

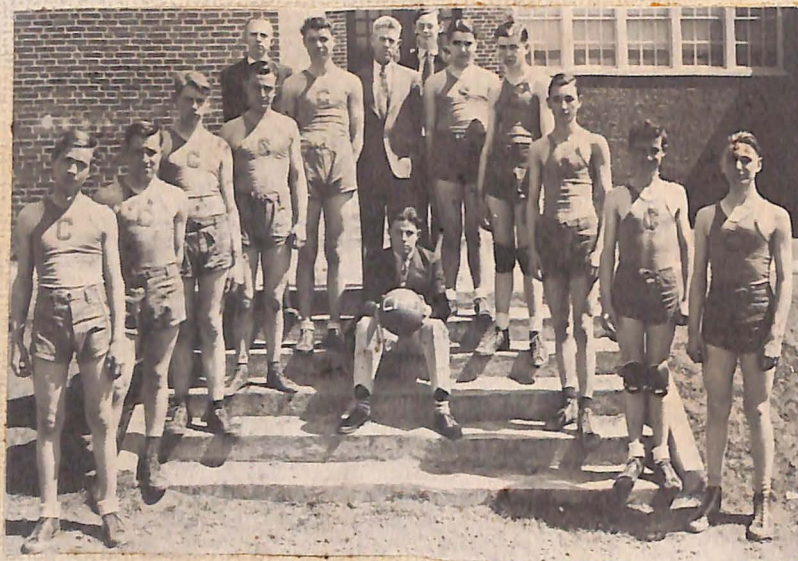
We have made many friends in the past year and hope to be able to make many more in the years to come.
