In assembly the Sophomore class gave a play entitled "Henry's Mail Order Wife" and the Juniors gave a program of impersonations.

The Rev. Mr. Turner, from Blacksburg, spoke to us concerning the Code of Ethics. A boy and girl will be awarded a "loving cup" by the Blacksburg Rotary Club for living closest by these rules.

We received our movie projector and have been thoroughly enjoying movies during our class periods.

March

The Senior Class was very sorry to lose their sponsor, Mrs. Henson, but welcomed Mr. Fred McCoy, who has served in the Navy for some time and is a former coach of Radford High School. Miss Blair became the new sponsor of the school paper. Mrs. Underwood, fifth grade teacher, also moved and her place was filled by Mrs. R. H. Sisson.

April

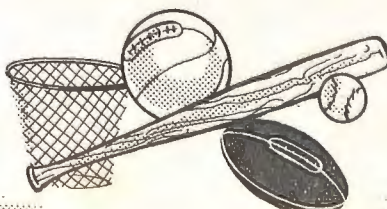

The night of all nights -- May 29, 1946 -- COMMENCEMENT.





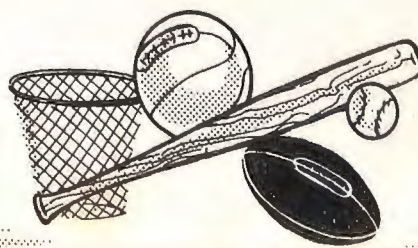

BASKETBALL TEAM

The Shawsville High School Girls basketball team enjoyed a very successful season, winning 16 out of 18 games.

The first game of the season was played on the Floyd court, November 16. This game was an easy win for the Shawnee girls with the score being 52 - 20.

National Business College came to Shawsville on November 29. The Shawnee girls captured this game from the famed Collegians 35 to 12.

On December 20, the Shawnees played host to our friendly rivals, Christiansburg. The final score was Christiansburg 15, Shawsville 43.

After much transportation trouble, the Shawnees met the Christiansburg Demons in Christiansburg, January 11. The Demons put up a good fight but lost to the Shawnees 41 to 27.

Troutville played host to the Shawnees January 18. This game became one more victory for the Shawnees. The score, Shawsville 54, Troutville 27.

The Shawnees met their first defeat on the Blacksburg court January 25. The game was close in the first half, but the Indians pulled away in the last quarter to defeat the Shawnees 45 to 40.

January 26, the Shawnees were visited by the Radford girls. The victory was an easy one for the school team with the final score 26 to 8.

Riner's home court was the scene for the next game on February 1. The Shawnees' second team started the game and was unable to hold down the Auburn team. The score at the end of the first quarter, 10 to 2 in Auburn's favor. The score, however, at the end of the game was 22 to 19 in the Shawnees favor.

The return game with Auburn on February 15 was one of the easiest victories of the year for the Shawnees. The final score was 45 to 4, with the Riner girls scoring their only two field goals in the first quarter.

One of the Shawnees' most interesting games was played February 19 on the Radford court. The team had greatly improved and the victory was not an easy one. The score was 34 to 29.

The Shawnees met Troutville for a return game on the Shawnees' floor on February 22. The final score, 43 to 29.

National Business College visited our court for the second time on February 23 and once more was turned back by the Shawnees 45 to 28.

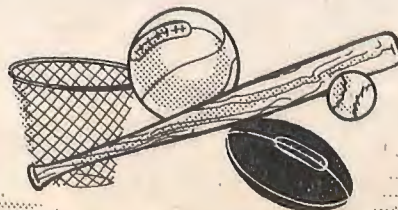
The Blacksburg girls met the determined Shawnees February 26. The Shawnees took the game 37 to 29.

On March 1, Floyd visited the Shawnees and once more lost to the Shawnees 48 to 21.

In a practice game with the Shawsville Independents the Shawnees were beaten 24 to 21.

The event of the year for the team was the winning of the Southwest Virginia Gold Medal Tournament. The Shawnees played three games, the first with Roanoke Mills. The game was the easiest of the tournament with the final score 28 to 16. The second game was against the famed Moosettes, against whom the Shawnees played their best game of the season with a final score 28 to 20. The last game of the tournament was with the much improved National Business College, who lost the game 31 to 21, on the Roanoke Auditorium floor. Awards were presented after the game and Audrey Smith and Hazel Via of the Shawnee team made the All-Tournament team.

Audrey Smith was high scorer for the year with the grand total of 503 points.





BASKETBALL TEAM

The season opened on November 16, when the Shawnee boys captured an easy victory from Floyd. The game was played on Floyd's home court and the score ran 35 - 16. Wimmer was high scorer for the winners.

The less experienced Shawnees won over the highly honored NBC players when they came to Shawsville on November 29. Saunders, playing one of his best games, topped with 10 out of the 21 points for Shawsville. National came up with 8.

CHS won from the Shawnees on Shawsville home court. Wimmer made 8 of the 24 for Shawsville, while Surber rolled in 16 out of 41 for the winners.

The top game of the season was played at Christiansburg when the Demons and Shawnees put up a tough fight. At the end of the first half CHS was leading with only 2 points. The Shawnees then came back fighting and determined, only to get edged out 43 - 45. The score was tied at the end of the game and while playing a three-minute overtime period the Shawnees scored first only to let the Demons tie them again. In the last minute of the overtime CHS rolled in a field goal to win the game. Saunders, high scorer for the losers, put in 12 points with Wimmer following close with 10. The Demon high scorer was Surber who topped the game with 10.

On January 18, the Shawnees took an easy victory from Troutville. 6 points were scored by Saunders to make the score 18 - 6, Shawsville's favor.

The boys traveled to Blacksburg on January 25, to lose a close game, 46 - 39. Wimmer was high scorer with 14 and Poff followed close with 13 out of the 39 for Shawsville. Chestnutt put Blacksburg out in front with 13 of the 46.

The Shawnees looked good against Auburn, winning 46 - 23. The game was played at Riner February 1. Richardson came up with 18 points for Shawsville.

Playing on their home court February 15, the Shawnees again showed up Auburn 35 - 21. Poff led with 11 points for the winners.

Very much improved and a little surprising to Shawsville, the Troutville boys came to Shawsville to win a close game, the final score being 25 - 21. Long and Brugh were high scorers both with 10 each for Shawsville and Troutville.


On February 23, our Shawnees again won over NBC. The game was a good one, ending 25 - 27. Richardson played one of his best games scoring 16 in Shawsville's favor.

Blacksburg's Indians rooted Shawsville's Shawnees out with a score of 31 - 22. Even though losers, the Shawnees put up a fight. Richardson scored highest with 7 and St. Clair followed with 6. Chestnutt put in 9 for the winners.

The Shawnees sparkled beside Floyd, taking an easy victory from them on March 1. Richardson made 16 for the winners while Wade and Poff followed close with 13 each. The final score was 47 - 10.

The Alleghany District Boys Club upset the Shawnees with a margin of 27 - 23. The game was good to the end and gave the onlookers a chance to see two Shawsville teams.

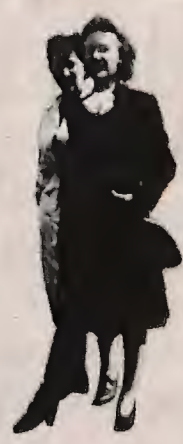
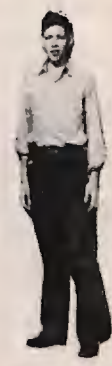
