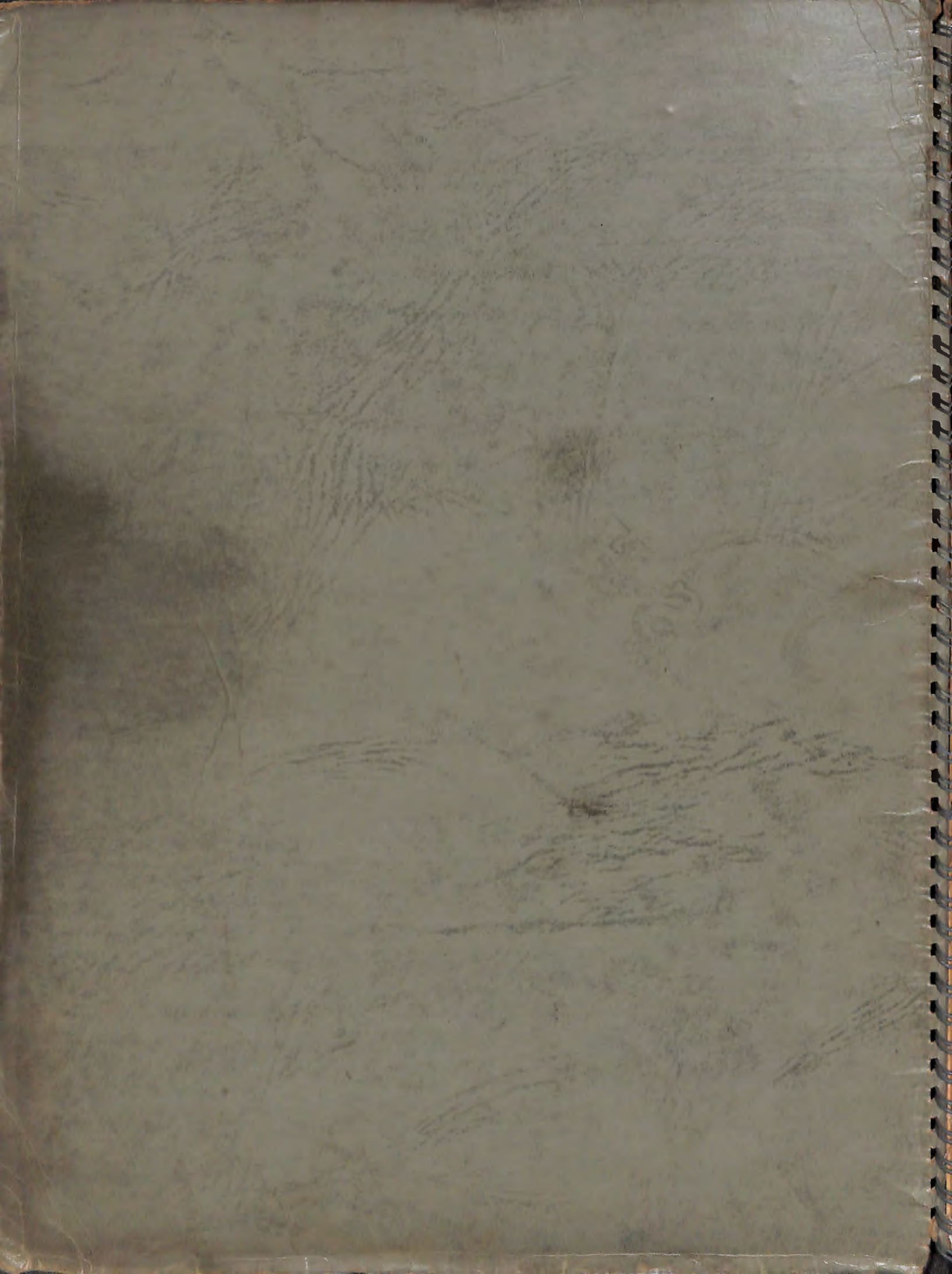


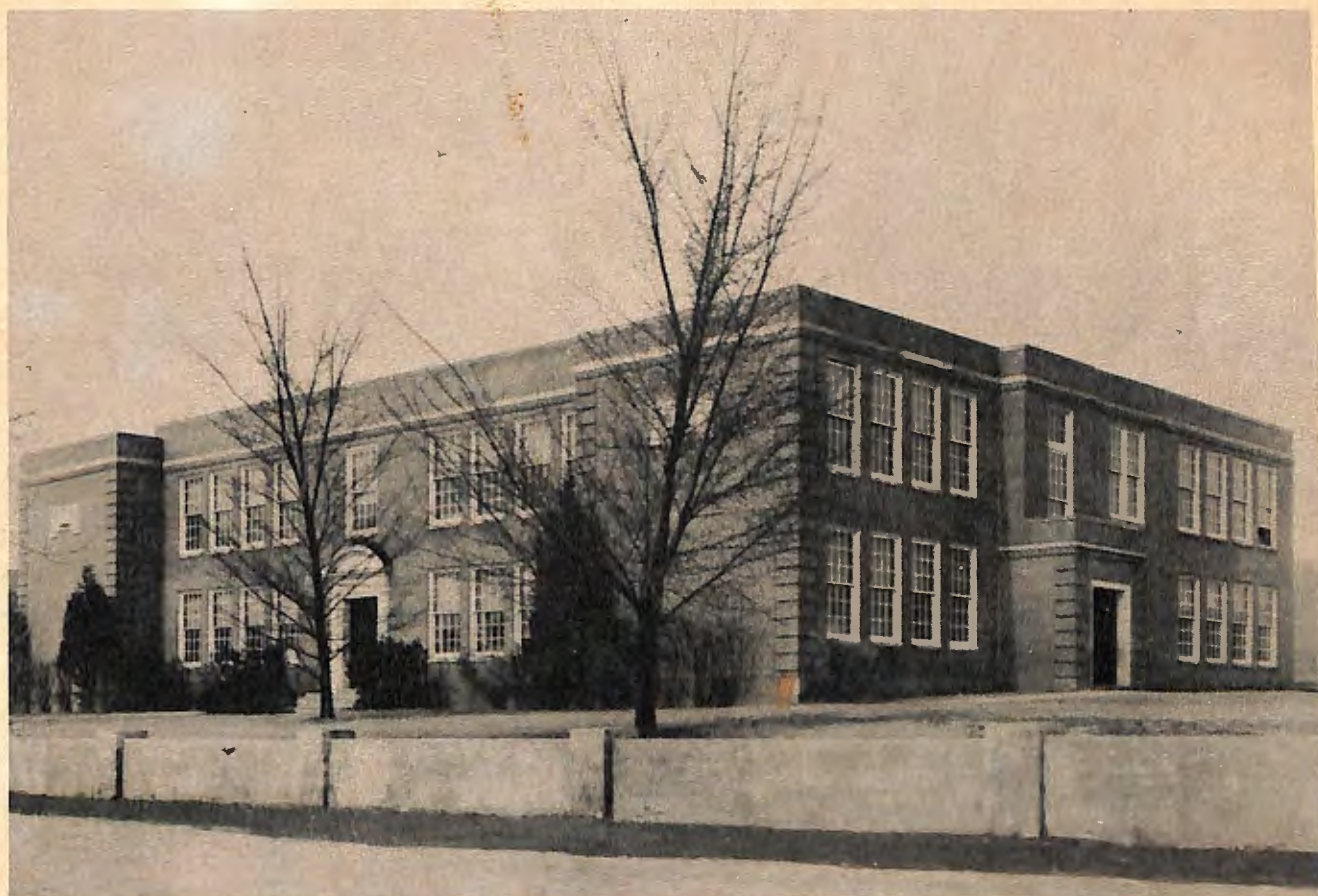

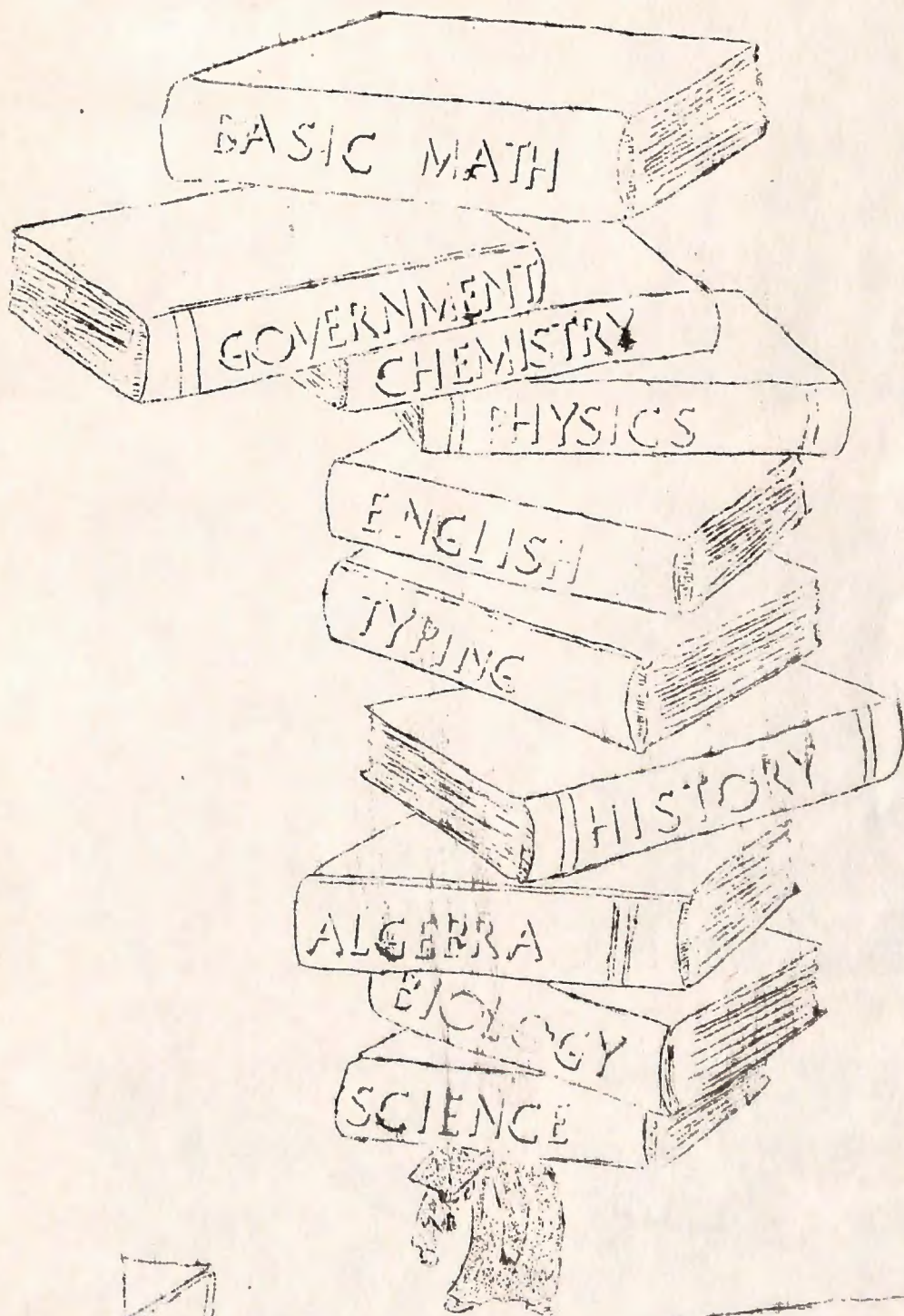

"Strange plants and herbs come before me. Busily working with them is Loraine Conner. She smiles as she tends the plants that are such a help to her in her medical research work."

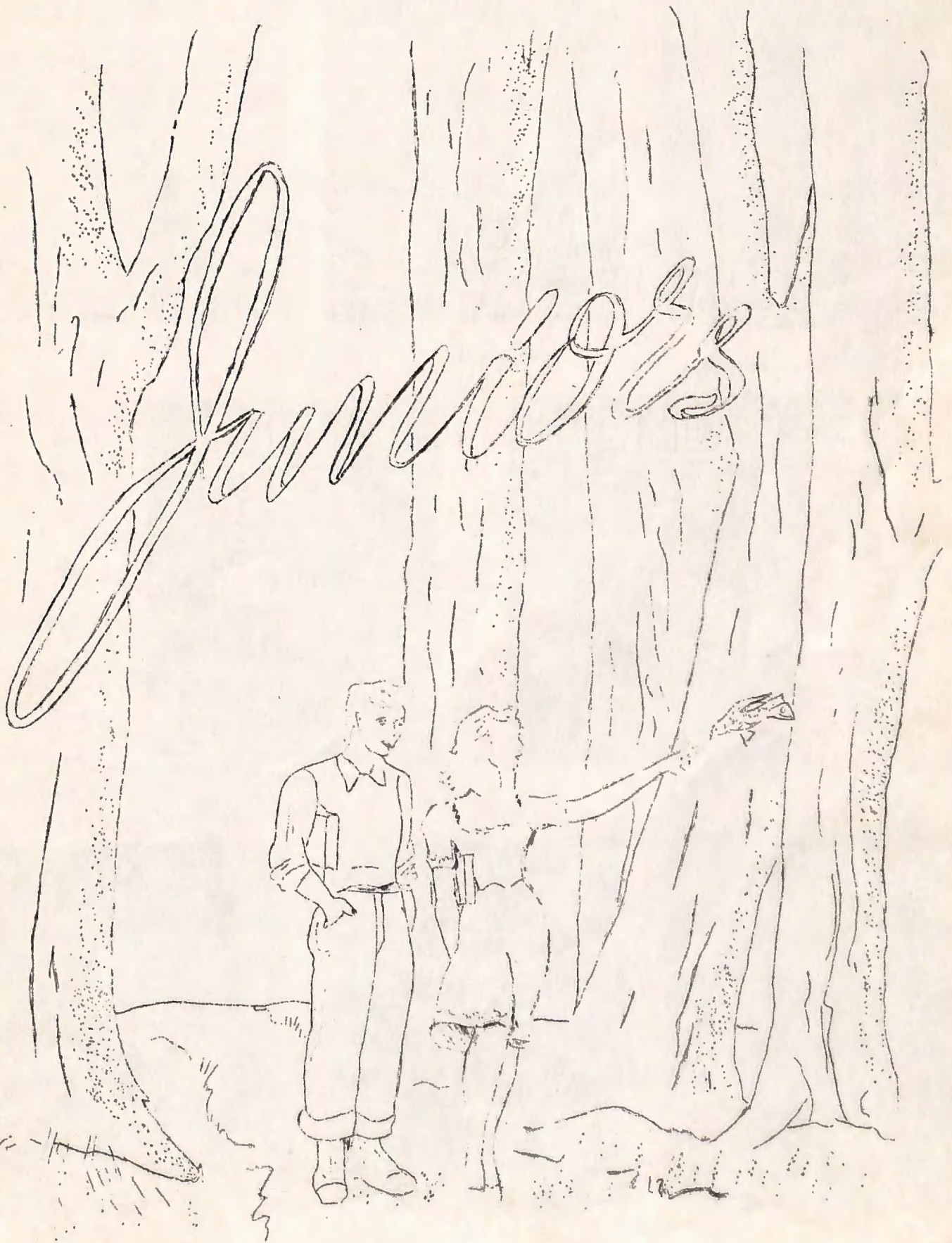
"In a small flower-filled yard surrounding a little white cottage is Donna Dooley looking pleased at the oil painting she has just completed."
