W. G. Perdue wills his GI haircut to Kenneth Noe.

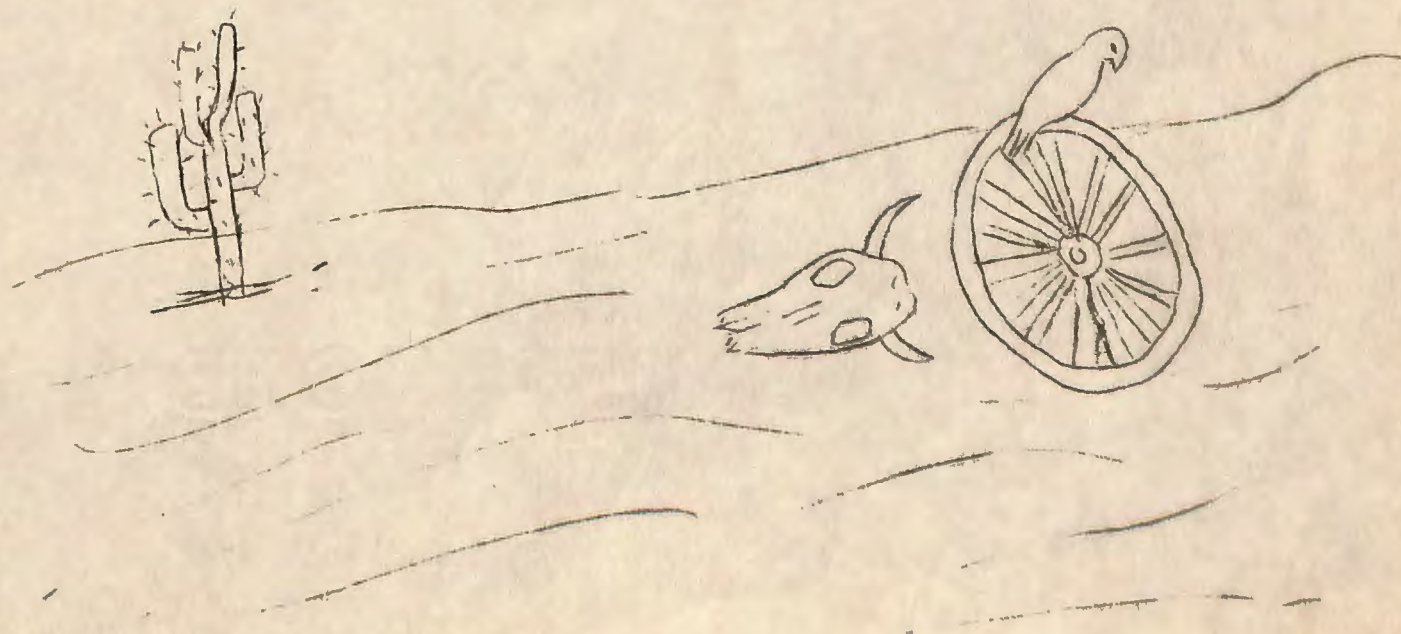
Jesse Worrell wills his ability to keep women happy to Kelly Perdue and his ability to doze in English Class because of coon hunting to Don Wilburn.

Raymond Kelly wills his authoritative voice in gym, coaching ability, and crush on Mr. Crush to Alvin StClair.

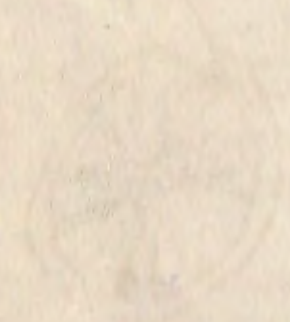

Hot off the wires from New York! EDDIE SEXTON has just discovered a formula for solving the most difficult geometry problem in two simple steps. Quite a brain!!

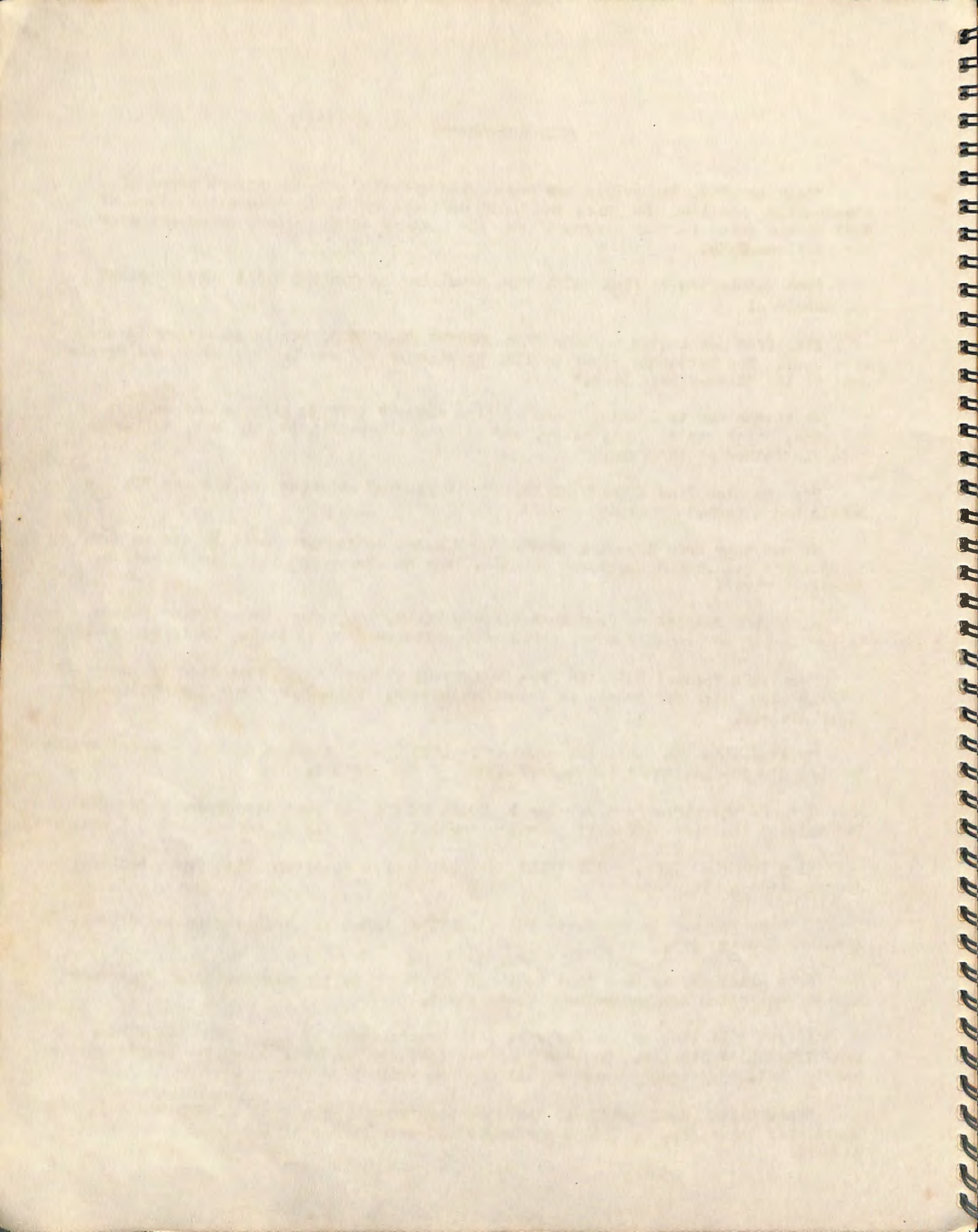
Also from New York, BETTY WELLS has just done a recording with Great Grandpa Jones. It's a hit, too!

The Montgomery County Superintendent of Schools has just published the list of teachers for next year. We find that MERLE HELM is teaching at Ironto.

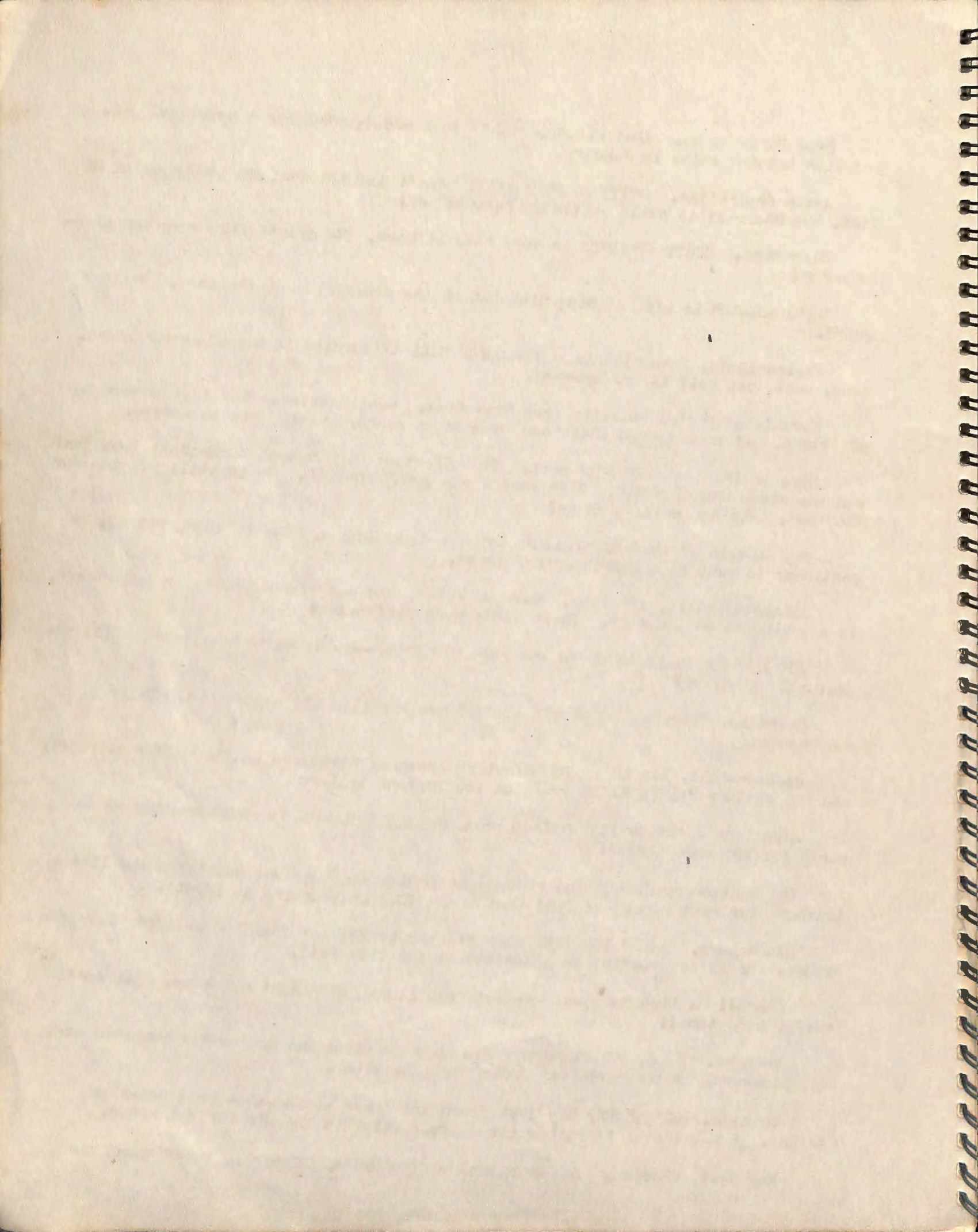
Blacksburg. JAMES LEE TESTERMAN started to VPI but found he couldn't make the grades. He is now working as a janitor at the City Hall.

Pearisburg. We see here one of those rare specimens--a perfect housewife. Yes, ERMA UNDERWOOD married Howard.

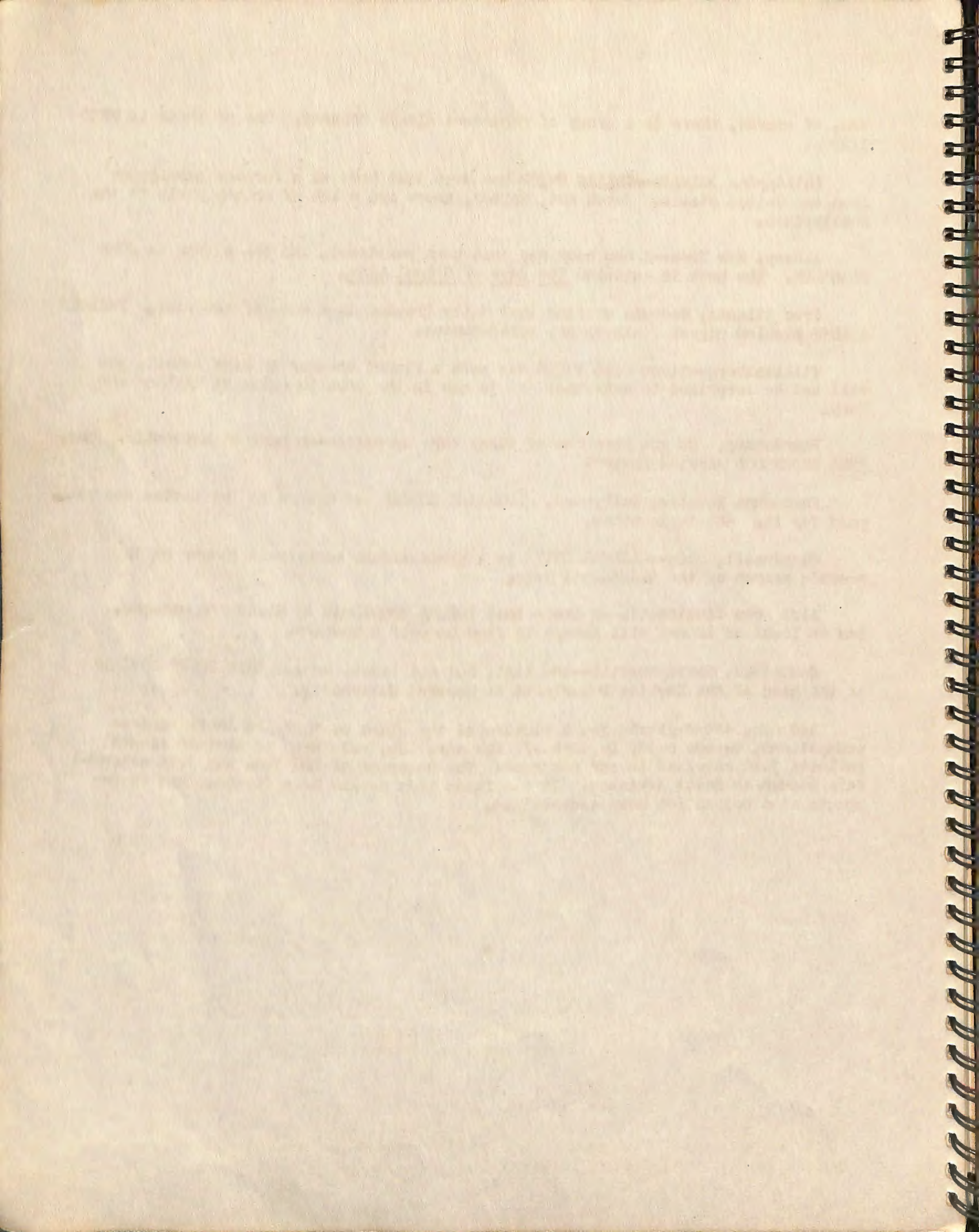
Paramount Theater, Hollywood. LORRAINE CONNER can now go to the movies and get paid for it. She is an usher.

THE FORTY-NINERS' CLASS HISTORY

On September 4, 1945, we the Senior Class of '49, entered Shawsville High School as freshmen. To many of us, this was an exciting and new adventure, mostly because we welcomed Mr. D. W. Richards as our new principal.

On September 3, 1947, our happy class again met at S.H.S. This year it seemed somewhat different to us. On this first day, we found that the Methodist Parsonage had been bought, to be used as a homeroom for some of us.

As we were still quite a large class, we again had to be divided into two sections. It was just our luck for half of us to be in the parsonage, but after all, it was very nice to have enough room, instead of being crowded.

This year we welcomed Mrs. Maurice Conner and Miss Barbara Stevens as our homeroom teachers. We also welcomed Mrs. Masters, Miss Atkinson, Mr. Richards, and Mrs. Watterson, as our other teachers. We were sorry to lose Mrs. Conner and Mrs. Watterson, but were glad to have Mrs. Stewart and Mr. Hicks to take their place. Later Mrs. Stewart resigned, and we welcomed Mrs. White in her place.

On November 24, a few of the Juniors went to Richmond with the Senior Class. We enjoyed the trip very much, even though we had quite a lot of traveling to do, since we made the trip in one day.

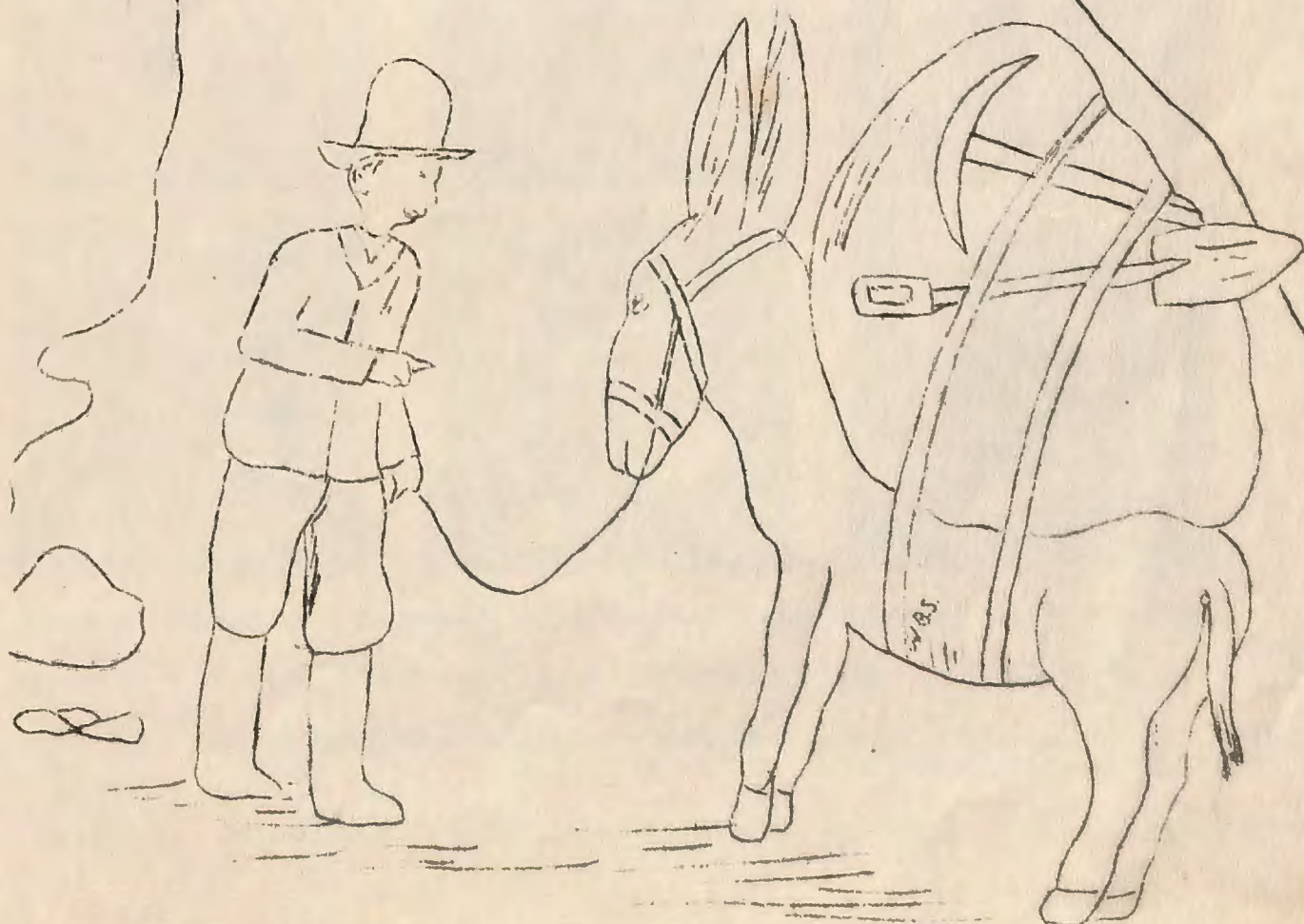

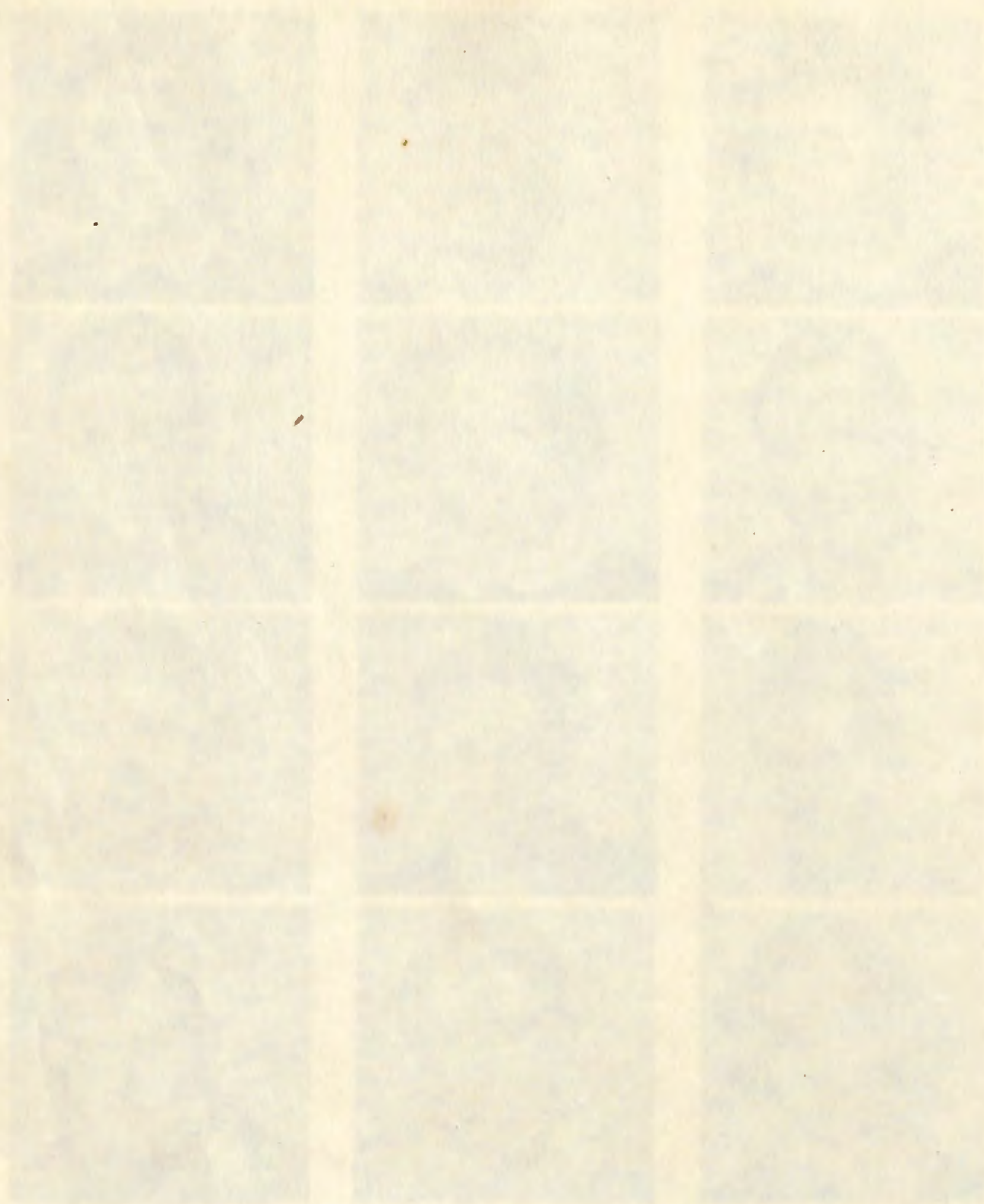

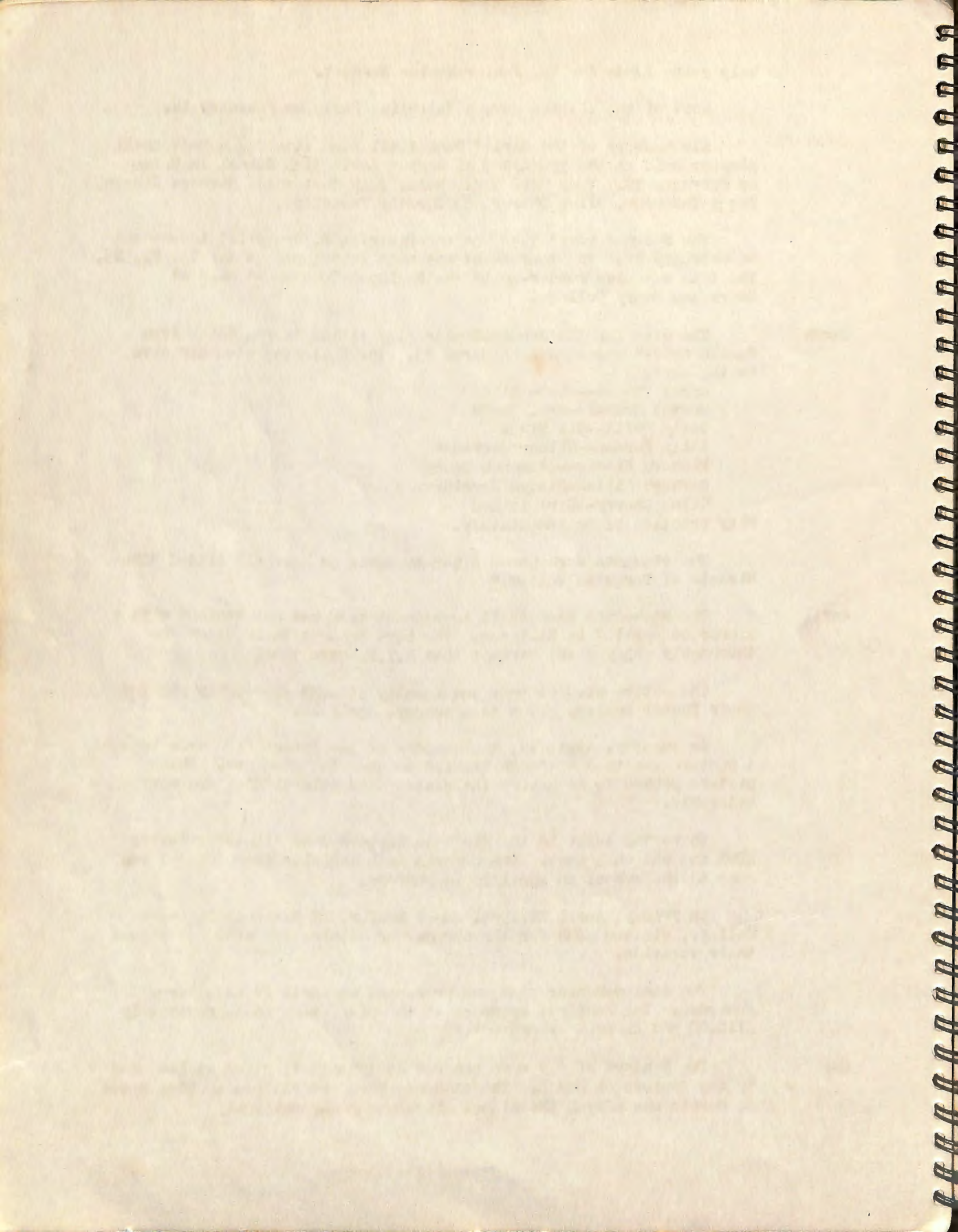
There was magic in the air when Captain John Finnerty visited ADHS and put on a show. The Captain is a magician from Pulaski and came to the school on April 20 to perform.
